Projects like Are You Ready? and Andurata Athwalak were shining examples of how service can be distributed at high levels through technology. Even during the final half of the year, the shift from virtual to physical projects set exemplary examples through projects like Zooxanthellae and Ceylon Safari, where our very own Rotaractors made sure to create the best standers while looking into the top level of executions. The yearly reporting team, led by club Secretary Rtr. Sanduni Liyanage deserves a tremendous round of applause as well.

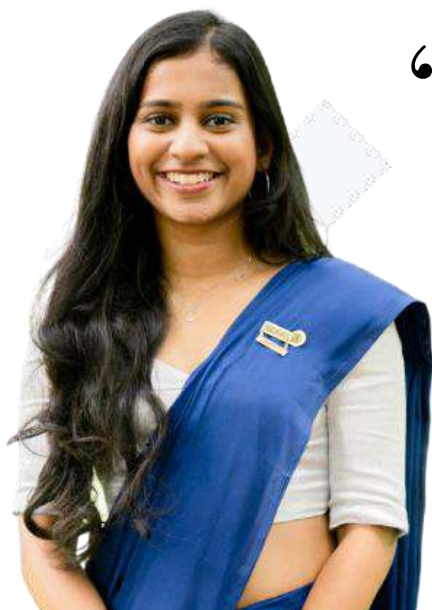

MESSAGE FROM SECRETARY

What sets apart Rotaract Mora from the rest? – Rounding up to one page was not that easy. But here we go! ”

Answering the question, it is without a doubt, the membership. Being blessed with a fraternity of over 300 inducted and prospective members, RotaractMora

is home to a diverse set of individuals coming from all walks of life, with only one thing in common: the passion to serve. It is with this passion that we have been fortunate enough to complete 80 projects across the five main avenues, putting over 20,000 volunteer hours from over 350 contributors, achieving all seventeen Sustainable Development Goals, and addressing all seven Rotary Focus Areas.

Being the first-ever institute-based Rotaract Club in Sri Lanka that started its journey with mere 16 individuals who dreamt big back in 1995, this prestigious club has grown eminently, reaching unexplored horizons and unlocking greater potential with each year. Under the theme of 'Redefining the Spirit of Lives', RotaractMora made its ultimate goal to always strive to create opportunity, instill impact, transform lives and add value to at least one individual involved with every step taken, be it to the beneficiaries of a project, its stakeholders, or its very own volunteers. The club proudly voyaged on its 26th year of celebrating service and writing impact stories under the capable leadership of Rtr. Bimsara Somarathna on the 1st of July 2021.

Heading into a year with the years'-long pandemic, the Rotaract year had a unique set of challenges that needed to be tackled strategically during different parts of the year. While the virtual environment was something new and exciting in the previous year, by the new Rotaract year, everyone was accustomed to it, rather growing weary of the same. This was the biggest hurdle put on the Club Service Avenue, where they had the ultimate responsibility of revamping the virtual environment and also bringing in a healthy balance between physical and virtual projects to strengthen the fellowship and

membership development within the club. Unfolding improved versions of online projects like 'Indiretto', the virtual treasure hunt; having significant growth in the hallmark Membership Development initiative 'Rota Spark'; and digitalizing the signature Club Service project 'CAST4', while also reviving 'Mithuru Sulanga' with Rotaract Club of Alumni of University of Moratuwa after 8 long years, the avenue rose to the challenge and conquered each challenge successfully.

Conducting meaningful community service under the ever-changing situation in the country could be said to be the biggest challenge faced by the Community Service Avenue. Remodeling the international award-winner 'Manusath Handa' to be 100% self-sustainable with the minimum effort of the club's end can be seen as a major investment for the project's continuity. 'Andurata Athwalak', which originally only served the visually impaired, expanded its scope encompassing the entire disabled community to conduct comprehensive soft skill and entrepreneurial skill development sessions, empowering the disabled to improve their employability in the competitive job industry. One of the most magnanimous efforts carried out this year was 'Hand in Hand' in the aid of the beautiful young souls at Maharagama Apeksha Hospital. Setting aside all difficulties encountered, the team powered through bringing in diverse strategies to raise funds on behalf of them. Portraying the truest sense of service, we were able to raise Rs. 1.3 million for their medical necessities, marking a significant milestone in the avenue. Moreover, 'Grama Prabodhaya' set off on its newest chapter in Dikhenā, Kaluthara, with a diary yet to be filled with memories and impact stories.

Raising its bar high, Professional Development Avenue pulled off the Official Career Fair of University of Moratuwa 'Are You Ready? 2021' facilitating 2000+ job interviews offering a fully-virtualized career fair experience for the candidates for its 26th year. With our own take on a scholarship grant similar to the Mahapola scholarship funded by the Sri Lankan government, we were able to distribute a total fund worth Rs. 2.5 million to the low-income undergraduates of the University of Moratuwa, with Mosvold Martinus Foundation as the sole partner of project 'The Scholar'. It was highly commendable seeing a single unit under the University of Moratuwa attempting to carry out a scholarship scheme similar to the national-

level scheme Mahapola, showing true testimony about the power of RotaractMora.

The year was an eventful one for International Services. The signature project 'Rotaract Mora Model United Nations' (RMMUN) made history in the books of RMMUN by hosting its first-ever hybrid Sri Lanka Rotaract Model United (SLRMUN) Conference and also bringing in the service aspect to the project by initiating an impactful and innovative sub-project 'Cognizant' that involved educating the students and the teachers of San Francisco and Bulgaria on the topics of English, Mathematics, and Robotics. At a time when the entire country was at a standstill going through one of its worst economic and political crises, the team was bold enough to go against all odds and revive 'Ceylon Safari' after a hiatus of two years. Bringing down three foreign Rotaractors from France, Colombia, and Romania, this experience made lifelong memories and forged friendships beyond geographical borders, proving yet again that the passion of RotaractMora makes the impossible indeed possible. Playing to the inherent strengths of RotaractMora, the avenue unfolded two more service initiatives that focused on enhancing the digital knowledge and its presence in the Tanzanian region as well as the Philippines region with the brand-new service projects 'Boon Digiiti' and 'Imahe'.

After years of research and preparation, the internationally acclaimed project 'Zooxanthellae 2021-22' took the centre stage, not only in the avenue of Environmental Services but also in the entire club's proceedings. The unparallel efforts of the Rotaractors working day and night for over six months led to being able to cover half a square kilometer of the sea with 100+ fractured live corals attached to specifically-designed 20 concrete boulders, thus giving voice to the importance of protecting the corals. Bringing in a novel and realistic approach to the conservation of the mangrove ecosystem, the members also got the opportunity to be involved in a massive restoration effort by planting 250+ mangrove plants in Hikkaduwa with 'Grove Green'.

As a leading technical university, RotaractMora is gifted with a set of strong technical minds. Embracing the new normal, the Digital Communications team spearheaded a further tech-driven digital transformation within the club, taking the club projects to the next level digitally. The supporting avenues of Public Relations and Editorial has done a stellar job in setting high standards for the club's public image and taking the stories we created out to the world.

If I had to sum up the Rotaract year 2021-22 in one word, I'd say it was a rollercoaster. With its ups, downs, the twists, and turns, it was a ride worth a million!

Thanking everyone who supported us throughout our journey of redefining the spirit of lives, it is with humble pride I invite you to explore the 26th chapter of a club that always embraces its values and celebrates diversities.

MEMBERSHIP STRATEGY

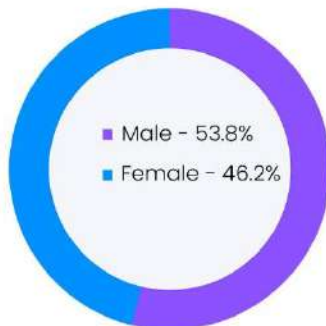

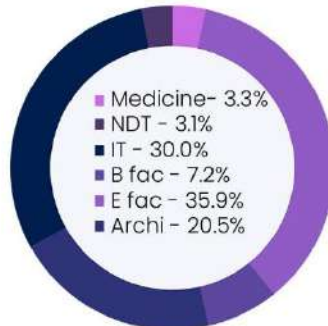


MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT AT A GLANCE

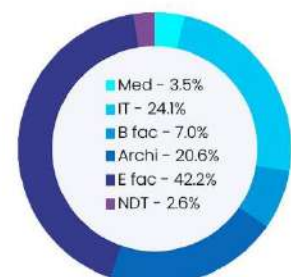

BATCH WISE DISTRIBUTION



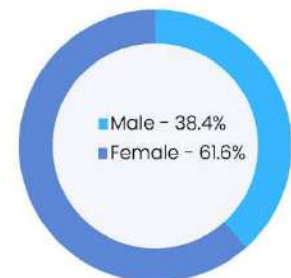
FACULTY WISE DISTRIBUTION

INDUCTIONS

Induction Process

The Induction Ceremony is considered a significant event in the RotaractMora calendar, as this is where the members get recognized for their commitment in an official context, after which they will be fortunate to represent RotaractMora in Rotaract District 3220. The core objective of the induction process is to maintain an active membership by recognizing the best of spirits while ensuring transparency and equal opportunities throughout the process.

The club's own **Digital Membership Tracking Platform LinkR**, is **strategized in the induction process to filter the best performing Rotaractors out of 1000+ undergraduates of University of Moratuwa**. Annually, undergraduates from all six faculties including **Engineering, Architecture, Business, IT, Medicine, and NDT** join with the RotaractMora at each enrolment of the new batch into the university. While the first-year undergraduates are mainly targeted in the induction process, the prospective members are only inducted after the close monitoring period.

Using the administrative dashboards and backend-generated results, the member activities are tracked and analyzed. Apart from the **LinkR-generated KPIs, attendance at monthly General Meetings and external club participation** is considered. After carefully observing the activity of members (as tracked by LinkR) over a period of one quarter, a list of prospective members is nominated for induction. These nominations were verified

by Avenue Directors and finally will be approved by the club President for induction.

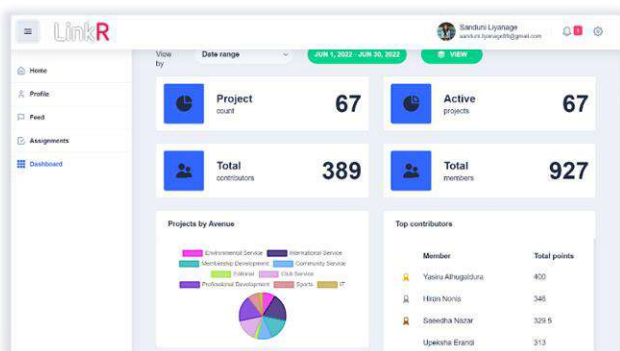
This year with the initiation of Elevate Rotaract policies, the filtering process took place under close observation, where the Membership team decided to limit the number of inductions to below 100 for the year. Hence, as mentioned above, **the induction process was carried out strategically while maintaining 100% transparency**.

During the Rotaract year 2021-22, three induction ceremonies were held in the first three quarters, where a total of **91 members were officially inducted** to Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa, thus bringing the **total membership of the club to 153 members**.

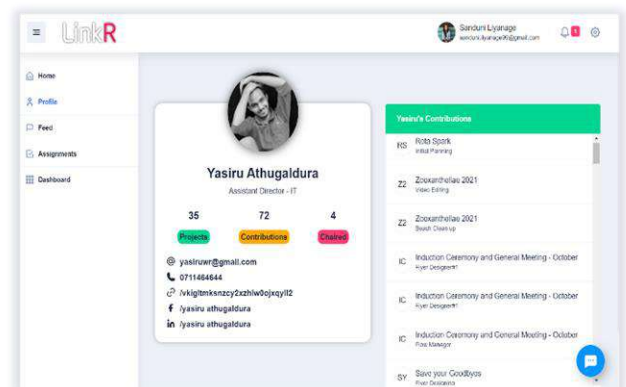
The dates of the Induction ceremonies are as follows.

TERMINATIONS

Termination Process

Terminations were carried out three times during the year. Members who were inactive for more than two quarters of the year, **members who left the university after graduation and members who were transferred to another Rotaract Club** are terminated from the club database. In total, **96 members were terminated during the Rotaract year 2021-22**. Like the induction process, the LinkR platform was utilized to track inactive members.

Furthermore, graduates who left the club were encouraged to continue their journey in Rotaract journey by joining Rotaract Club of Alumni of University of Moratuwa or any other community based Rotaract Club. The process of Outbound Transfers is further elaborated on in the document. The terminations were reflected in the Rotary International Portal in parallel to the changes on RMIS.

INBOUND AND OUTBOUND TRANSFERS

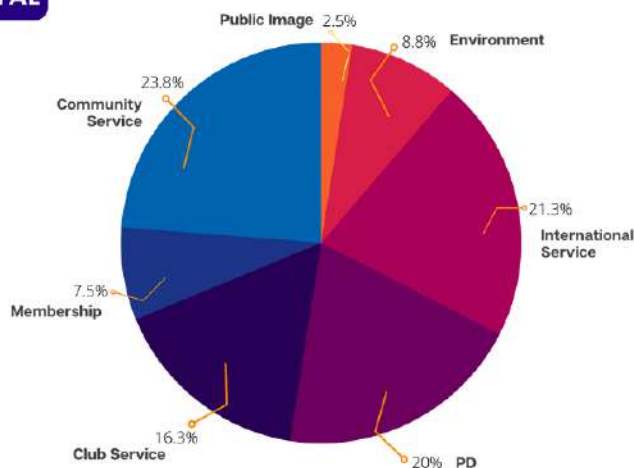

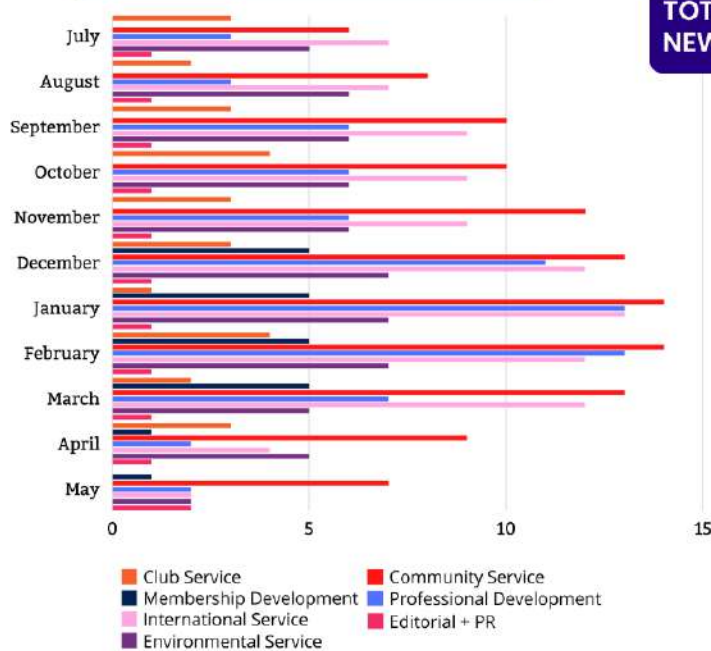

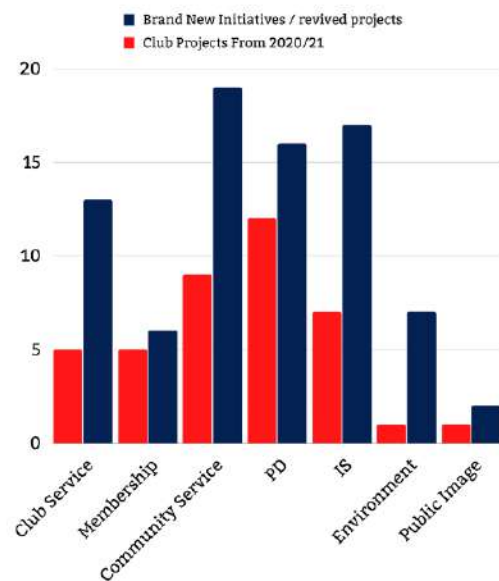

After that came the execution of **'Trivia Fiesta'**, which was a trivia competition based on some TV and film series, developed to give a break for all the Rotaractors in the district from their monotonous schedules. Even though this was the first time such an initiative was carried out by us, more than 150 participants took part in this, and 23 peer club involvement was recorded as well, which helped us to achieve our project KPIs.

As one of the most important projects in the calendar of RotaractMora, **26th Installation Ceremony** was conducted as the first virtual installation ceremony of the RotaractMora history, considering the situation in the country and the project timeline of the club. In addition to that, a board outing was also organized for the board members, providing an opportunity for them to get to know each other better.

One of the novel projects executed by the Club Service Avenue was **'El Talento'**, which was aimed to be a platform for our very own Rotaractors from RotaractMora to showcase their various talents. Receiving more than 100 submissions from all categories of the competition helped to inspire the team that worked hard for a project of this kind.

Music speaks for what we cannot express, and it can soothe our minds. As undergraduates and Rotaractors, we hustle to finish our work but sometimes we forget to

enjoy our lives. Taking a short break from all the virtual projects, we were able to

bring project Mithuru Sulanga into life after almost a decade,

which was done in collaboration with Rotaract Club of Alumni of University of Moratuwa. This was held at Rock House, Piliyandala and around 100 Rotaractors gathered to enjoy this musical evening.

Second edition of **'Indiretto'**, the virtual treasure hunt, was held through the exclusively designed web platform to promote the importance of teamwork.

Without letting the pandemic interrupt the successful flow of **CAST 4**, newbies of the RotaractMora family were able to participate in an **'Online Awurudu'** and **Ludo competition** in the month of April. Especially amidst the recent situation in the country, it was exciting to see more than 550 participants actively taking part in CAST 4 – 2022, which was planned under the theme 'The Lord of the Rings and The Hobbits'. Newbies were divided into four houses, namely, 'Shire', 'Dale', 'Mirkwood' and 'Mordor'. Even though the competitions were intense, developing fellowship was always encouraged among the participants.

Even though it was not easy to plan and execute projects with less amount of physical presence of the members, we believe that not only Rotaractors from RotaractMora, but many other Rotaractors in the District 3220 were also able to get benefits out of the projects carried out by the Club Service Avenue. With 562 newbies joining our CAST4 program along with 224 competition submissions for the events we organise and 22 peer Rotaract Club involvements, we have marked a golden line in the journey of Club Service Avenue.

It was really encouraging to see many passionate members in the club, giving their 100% to serve the community.

Being the most valuable asset of RotaractMora, it is important to utilize our members' skills while creating opportunities for them to develop themselves and broaden their network. We could look into developing a proper fund-raiser for the club as we are not currently collecting any membership fee from the members. This could be achieved as the whole world is slowly getting used to the post-pandemic era and new normal.

Also, more collaborative events with other clubs in the district could develop the mutual understanding between the members of RotaractMora and peer clubs while increasing the quality of the service we provide to the society.

We, the Club Service team enjoyed the past term to the fullest and hope.

TEAM MESSAGE



As a university-based Rotaract club, having a sustainable and diversified member base is one of the most crucial factors. We as the Membership development avenue are the ones who are utilizing the member base of the club in the most efficient way while supporting all other avenues by identifying the best performing members and recognizing their efforts in the best way possible.

This year, our mission was to **provide required recognition to the best performing members while raising the quality of their hard work over the quantities we measured.** Our journey as an avenue was not a bed of petals; we went through several hardships, and we were presented with several challenges in this virtual platform.

With the Covid-19 pandemic, we did not have many chances to gather physically. Therefore, we had to ensure that the people we are recognizing here as the inducted members are the best set of people with much dedication and passion towards the movement that we can have. That was a challenging situation because we were seeing them only through Zoom or another distance communication platform. But with the time being, we were able to have a few physical project initiations and gatherings. Through those gatherings, we were able to analyze the characteristics of a few of them to some extent by reminding us that “having something is better than nothing”. Moreover, depending on their reactions through virtual settings and their enthusiasm toward the Rotaract movement were also observed closely. By analyzing all the above-mentioned factors and their performance through **LinkR – the contribution portal**, we were able to induct a total number of 91 general members under three induction ceremonies and we were able to provide the “Spirit of Services Nominee” award for a total number of 35 general members in the Annual Awards Ceremony.

As an avenue, this year we were able to successfully complete a total of 12 projects. Among them, the signature project of the Membership Development Avenue, **“Rota Spark”** plays a major role, which is known as the orientation program of Rotaract Club of University

of Moratuwa. Under Rota Spark, we had four sub-projects namely, Rota Novatos, The Orientation, Ignition, and Open week. Among these four sub-projects, one project was planned by focusing exclusively on the Institute of Technology of the University of Moratuwa (NDT) undergraduates. Since we have a relatively lower number of general members representing NDT, we thought of holding a separate orientation program in order to provide them with a fruitful idea about RotaractMora.

The other three sub-projects under Rota Spark main project were held by focusing on the upcoming 21 batches of the University of Moratuwa. Which was more like an ice-breaking session and informative session for them. We had a series of games for them that were strategically build-up by the avenue directors, project chairs, and 20 batch general members of RotaractMora. This year we were able to plan and execute this massive project as a whole very effectively. To carry out the game series in an effective way, we had decided to initiate a few new games such as “Crossword Puzzle”, which we believed to have helped us to accomplish our goal of reinforcing the ideals of RotaractMora, to the newbies. For this game, under 8 signature Rotaract projects, the newbies were divided among 8 kingdoms (teams) and they were asked to make a crossword puzzle out of the project. Then, the competition, which we named “The Collector”, took the form of “a card collecting competition” and was also another newly initiated game. There we posted 36 cards on a Google site created for the competition, including 30 cards with details and illustrations of Rotaract Avenues and several significant RotaractMora projects. Moreover, we implemented some of last year's games to some extent as well. Intro video competition and the editorial competition has been implemented by adding aspects important in the Rotaract context.

Widening our member base through the university's newly initiated Faculty, Faculty of Medicine was another main challenge we were faced with. To gather more undergraduates from the Faculty of Medicine as active members, we initiated a new project called **“Suwa Petha”**. The project “Suwa Petha” is grounded on building a healthy and balanced young person in a virtual environment, and the project was implemented with an Organising committee consisting of newbies from the Faculty of Medicine. It consisted of promoting the idea of a healthy lifestyle through a flyer series, which ultimately led to two webinars. The webinars addressed the areas of physical health, healthy diet, exercise, meditation, obesity, posture, eyesight problems, and health issues that could

arise, especially in undergraduates, about a sedentary lifestyle ensued by a tragic episode of the pandemic for almost two years now.

The Annual Awards Ceremony of Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa 'Premio Formalita' is marked as the final project in the RotaractMora calendar. Premio Formalita recognizes the hard work and determination shown by our membership throughout the year to appreciate the major contributions for the successful end of an eventful year. This created the much-needed engagement between the club members, thereby gathering over 100 eager Rotaractors for the event. Reminiscing the electrifying spirit of a physical RotaractMora prior to the Covid 19 situation, this was a night to remember for all who were present.

As a final note, we would like to extend our heartiest gratitude to each and every individual who supported us throughout the year to ensure the sustainability of the upcoming year of the RotaractMora and to complete all above projects in high notes. **Without your great support we could not have achieved this much as an avenue as well as a club.**

One of the yearly hallmark Membership Development initiatives, Rota Spark was held with the key objective of attracting new undergraduates who entered the University of Moratuwa, giving the newcomers an introduction to the club, discussing the many aspects of the club and the advantages of joining. Rota Spark provided them with a perfect platform to recognize and groom their skills while forming friendships that are not only crucial in university life but also will be beneficial in the future. To add a bit of spice and fun the theme 'Lord of the Rings' was selected, after which the newbies were allocated to 8 groups namely Mordor, Shire, Isengard, Rohan, Gondor, Mirkwood, Erebor, and Dale which were some of the prominent houses in the Lord of the Rings trilogy. The main objective of Rota Spark was to provide a solid membership to the club and also identify the leaders, designers, writers, and hidden talents of the newbies. Not only that, but the initiative also allowed each member to participate in the idea-creation process within the club, allowing them to openly express their thoughts, suggestions, and improvement suggestions in order to make RotaractMora a reactive and active place.

The project consisted of five sub-projects, Rota Novatos, Orientation, Ignition, Open Week, and the Closing Ceremony.

Rota Novatos

The enthusiastic young individuals in NDT of the 19th batch were invited to take part in Rota Novatos organized as the first sub-project of Rota Spark and to get to know more about Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa and its services. This project embraced the intention of increasing the number of active members of the club and getting their maximum output for completing upcoming projects successfully. It was held virtually on the 8th of January 2022 via the Zoom platform. In order to give a better understanding, presentations from every avenue were presented by co-directors of relevant avenues to

increase their understanding of each avenue and with the aim of getting their contribution for projects in their preferable avenues. With the key purpose of improving awareness about Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa among students of the NDT 19th batch, Rota – Novatos successfully marked its conclusion with more than 200 participants via Zoom and more than 350 registrations by giving a proper image about the club for the NDT Newbies. A 200% increase in the participation was seen compared to the previous year

The Orientation

'The Orientation' was Identified as the most crucial subproject in the line-up because this was the first time that the club interacts with the new batch as Rotaractors of University of Moratuwa. Informal meetings were carried out before the event with the newbies, to have friendly discussions while giving self-introductions about themselves. Apart from creating a good and strong basis where newbies can step towards the club, another main objective of the orientation program was to identify future Rotaractors with graphic designing and video editing skills. Therefore, two separate competitions: the "Graphic Designing Competition" and the "Creative Intro-video Competition" were organized, and thereby identified the talents of the upcoming generation in those aspects. The final event of Orientation was conducted on a grand level with the participation of our very own President Rtr. Bimsara Somarathna and other members of the board of directors.

The Orientation marked the participation of 650+ new members, with a 130% increase from last year.

Ignition

With the Orientation ending, an audience that consisted of the Orientation registrants, and is capable and potent

was gathered around the club. The next stage was the club's official introducing session, during which the directors of each avenue were given the opportunity to give a presentation on the projects, nature, and essential purpose of their various avenues. Intending to keep the participants interacting with the project two challenges were organized under IGNITION: 'The Editorial Competition', which consisted of a poetry competition and a short story or movie review competition, and the Crossword puzzle which allowed the newbie to gain knowledge regarding the signature projects of the club. Newbies were energetic throughout the two weeks determined to bring glory to their respective kingdom. The ignition day was filled with the avenue presentations and some fun games such as Decode me, Riddles, and dance items by the freshers.

The Open Week

The project's third pitstop was Open Week and the main objective was to ensure that newbies had the opportunity to engage and chat with the avenue directors. This was an opportunity for the younger generation to learn more about RotaractMora's activities and projects and gain insights into the club avenues. The avenues were Professional Development, International Services, Public Relations, and Editorial, Environment and Community Services along with the participation of the Board of directors of the respective avenues. 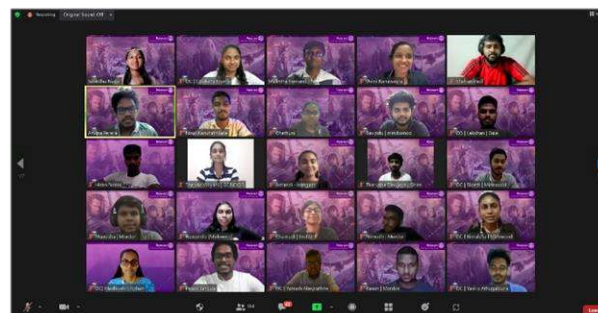

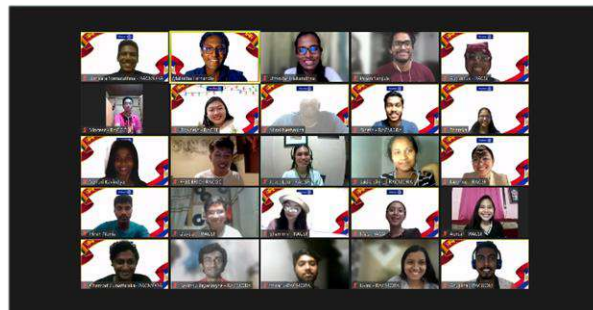
14. Co-mingle

COMMUNITY SERVICE AVENUE



TEAM MESSAGE



The year 2021-22 has taken quite a planning form for the community service avenue. Many of the projects under the avenue needed a makeover in terms of conducting them, as the current situation of the country has changed drastically during the last 2-3 years. Taking things into consideration, it was decided that this year, most of the projects conducted under the avenue will be closely examined and changes will be made to ensure that they are sustainable for the upcoming years.

Talking about the projects done during the year, project **Manusath Handa**, aimed toward the visually impaired community with the hopes of assisting them through their educational journey took on a more self-sustaining persona thanks to the introduction of the contributors' portal, which enabled the volunteers to choose any scripts they would like to record and upload it by themselves without much interference from the RotaractMora. Manusath Handa was also able to expand itself to include 60+ short stories, aside from the annual past paper recordings recorded for A/L students who are facing their examinations.

Manusath Handa was also able to organise

the online voice donation camp for the second successive year,

with over 100+ participants representing 20+ local as well as foreign Rotaract clubs. The voice donation camp was able to record 60+ scripts containing simple to advanced English conversations revolving around many topics such as asking for directions to conducting interviews. This subproject also paved the path for the RotaractMora to get valuable feedback from the participants on how they perceive the project and any improvements they would think would help the continuation and the development of both the voice donation camp and Manusath Handa.

Moving to another significant project within the avenue, **Hand in Hand (HiH)**, a project dedicated to helping the

cancer community within the country, decided to focus more on raising funds and interacting with the general public this year, as most of the other aspects of the project that centres around interacting with the children and adults at Apeksha hospital and CCC were prohibited due to the ongoing pandemic. Nevertheless, the teams decided to get creative and get the outside parties involved in helping the community. The first step of this project was to hold an online arts competition, Colours, in line with the children's day to understand how people perceive cancer, which garnered 150+ submissions. It also helped the social media pages of the project to gain more exposure which helped immensely towards the latter part of the project. The main focus of HiH during RI year 2021-22 was to raise funds to purchase much-needed medicinal items for the cancer patients residing in Apeksha hospital. To do so, the project focused on the annual December and April shopping festivals at BMICH and the sale of T-shirts to the undergraduates of the University of Moratuwa. At the end of the year, the HiH team was able to donate

Rs 1.3 million worth essential medicine to the Apeksha Hospital

and conclude the project in high spirits.

Project **Andurata Athwalak** saw a huge development this year, as it expanded its focus group from the visually impaired to the whole disabled community. Andurata Athwalak was able to join hands with some distinguished NGOs, Enable Lanka and Big Hearts Community for T.A.R.G.E.T. Programme (Training through Accessible and Remote Guided Educational Techniques), a 6-month training program funded by the American Centre, and was introduced as part of the Microsoft Enabler Program created for disabled undergraduates/graduates with the main aim of developing their English language skills, entrepreneurial skills, and social skills. The goal of the project was to develop the most sought-after skills for a general employee and secure employability opportunities for these enthusiasts.

Successful relationships with these organisations led to more lucrative endeavours such as '**Unseen Harmonies**', a Carol service conducted by a visually impaired choir in honour of the December season and secondary intentions of raising funds for the well-being of the group. Due to the immense success, it garnered during its launch, subsequent requests were received for more carol sessions. With a total of 3 sessions, 'Unseen

Harmonies' were able to raise nearly Rs. 100,000 in cash and gift bags (courtesy of Odel). The success of the event also led the choir to gain more publicity. An event named 'Spotlighting' was held for a group of disabled women entrepreneurs with the aim of helping them gain more exposure. 'Andurata Athwalak' was concluded for the year with more plans for the coming year.

'Nena Aruna', a project focusing on educating the students who live in underprivileged villages and have less access to education facilities, decided to hold online sessions for the students who are facing their A/L examinations. Following that, 51 seminars for the main A/Level topics, namely Combined Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Accounting, Economics, and ICT, were held in September and October. Students from districts Colombo, Gampaha, Kalutara, Galle, Kandy, Anuradhapura, and Matara, among others were in attendance. The project also utilised its existing **Learnyou platform** to help students explain any questions they had about the subject matter.

'Connecting the Dots', a project initiated to connect different communities across Sri Lanka to prevent conflicts and promote peace, reconciliation and harmony decided this year to expand its scope to include months of continuous work, as it was believed deeper relationships can be built within communities during longer and strenuous work. As such Project Shalom, a project aimed toward helping the catholic community residing in Negombo, partnered up with the Big Hearts Community thanks to the good relationships fostered during the year, laid the groundwork to teach 20+ students who will be facing their O/L examinations coming December. The first step of this process was to create a fundraiser to collect funds for stationery packs to be given to 40-50 students in Negombo who had financial difficulties. With the help of the Big Hearts Community, funds were collected to donate 45 stationary packages. After the successful donation, a session was conducted for 20+ students to get a better understanding of what subjects they require help with for their examination, and how receptive they were to the idea of learning the English language. The session was a success and plans were drawn to conduct it every fortnight.

'Vannakam', a project aimed at helping the Tamil community residing in Jaffna, was also initiated during the year with discussions held between the two clubs, Rotaract Club of Nallur Heritage and Rotaract Club of Faculty of the Engineering University of Jaffna. After a series of research, discussions, and a feasibility analysis

J/ Muththuththampi Maha Vidyalayam located in Thirunelveli was selected to implement the project. The background needed to implement the project was completed just like Grama Prabodaya, and the avenue plans to commence the project at the beginning of the next RI year. Similarly, As-Salamu Alaikum, a project aimed at helping the Muslim community residing in the Ampara district, will kick-start next year, with the foundation laid during the year.

A special thank you should go to all the volunteers who contributed to the success of all these projects, as it was not an easy year for Rotaractors. Amidst pandemic situations, sudden lockdowns, civil unrest and economic concerns, our members always found a way to ensure that the projects would continue and would adjust themselves and the nature of the projects according to the changing conditions of the country. This year as mentioned, most of the projects were re-evaluated and plans were put in place to make them adaptable to the changing circumstances. Additionally, talking about the impact made throughout the year it can be mentioned communities; Visually impaired students, cancer patients, disabled undergraduates, visually impaired adults, disabled women entrepreneurs, underprivileged students facing A/L examinations, and rural villages across the country are some of the communities among others that were targeted to better their lives. The young volunteers of the club also gained valuable opportunities to interact with some of the members of these communities, gain better insights into their lives and enrich themselves with the experiences gained.

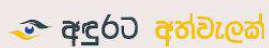

1. Manusath Handa

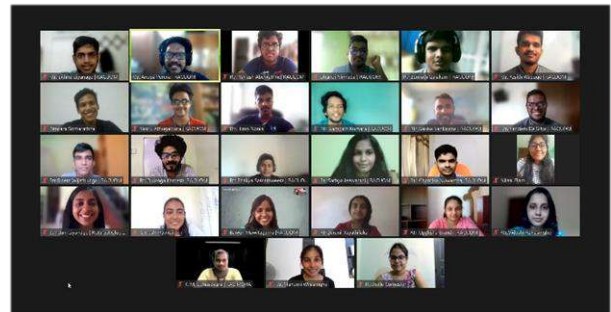

Manusath Handa - 'Voice of Humanity' is a project conducted with the goal of improving the educational situation for visually impaired students across the country. The main goal of this project is to give those targeted groups convenient access to education by transforming instructional resources relevant to their curriculum into audiobooks. In comparison to Braille equipment, which they generally use, the Principal of the School for the Deaf and Blind in Ratmalana has noted that audiobooks are convenient and enjoyable for the progress of students' education. One of the major difficulties faced by visually impaired students is the lack of educational resources. Compared to the number of resources available to other students, this is a tremendous setback in their curriculum. To fill this gap, RotaractMora provides them with audiobooks containing educational material.

The scope of the project has been expanded to focus on both the students who are studying for GCE Advanced Level and G.C.E Ordinary level. Past papers and answers in 6 subjects (History European, History Lanka, Buddhist Civilization, Media, Political Science, Sinhala) were converted into audiobooks.

The recording series took place in several phases where passionate volunteers were invited to join us in the process. Through the Manusath Handa Contributors' Portal, Rotaractors and non-Rotaractors have contributed to recording these papers. The portal has made the project **self-sustainable**, where the contributors can access the material through it and upload the audios there. It also serves as an online archive of A/L and O/L past papers.

During this year, team Manusath Handa was able to produce 250+ voice recordings with the help of more than 250 volunteers who donated their voices. These recordings can be accessed via the Manusath Handa [E-library](#).



As education frees the mind, expands the imagination, and is essential for self-esteem, it can be identified as the key to prosperity and opens up a world of possibilities, allowing everyone to make a positive contribution to a progressing and healthy society. Learning is beneficial to everyone and should be available to everyone and 'Manusath Handa' ensured that inclusive and quality education was achieved all throughout the project.

Online Voice Donation Camp

To celebrate World Sight Day, Manusath Handa organized a Voice Donation Campaign on the 17th of October 2021 to aid the visually impaired community. The campaign was conducted via the Zoom platform and brought a 100+ volunteer base of the Rotary-Rotaract community from over 20 local and foreign clubs, project volunteers, and corporate individuals around the country to one platform to donate their voices for a greater cause. Catering to the development of English proficiency, the donation camp was useful in offering a non-conventional way for the visually impaired to improve their skills and empower the said community.

Through education and employment, the project attempts to promote equal rights for the visually impaired. Manusath Handa has taken a timely step to assist Sri Lanka's prime national endeavour in uplifting the education of the visually impaired, with a large volunteer base and a well-built digital audiobook collection.

2. Andurata Athwalak

Andurata Athwalak is a signature project in the Community Service Avenue that was conducted with the primary motive of increasing the level of confidence, efficacy, and the opportunities the disabled youth have in the employment world. Taking forward the efforts in 2019 when Andurata Athwalak was originated, this year, the project was officially brought into being on the 3rd of August 2021, in collaboration with the Enable Lanka Foundation, the Big Hearts Foundation, and partnering up with the American Cultural Center.

Last year, Andurata Athwalak, the innovative program based on the learning curves of a landmark Community Service project, Manusath Handa, came to life with the goal of increasing the English proficiency abilities of visually impaired children. Transcending from lending our voices to paint the world with the seven fragrances of the rainbow, present year, we have expanded our ultimate goal and now cater to the entire disabled community rather than only being limited to the visually impaired, a step forward.

This year, our significant focus was to primarily create professionalism among the disabled youth community. Emphasizing the importance of English proficiency, as well as the development of social skills and business etiquette, Andurata Athwalak focused on the development of fundamental English language skills of disabled youth so that they would not be put at a disadvantage in employment.

The project was carried out in several stages;

T.A.R.G.E.T. Programme (Training through Accessible and Remote Guided Educational Techniques)

This was a program created for disabled undergraduates/graduates with the main aim of developing their English language skills, entrepreneurial skills, and social skills. The goal of the project was to develop the most sought-after skills for a general employee and secure employability opportunities for these enthusiasts. These sessions were conducted via Zoom along with self-assessments, evaluations, and interactive sessions with the aid of our Volunteering team, Enable Lanka Foundation, and the Big Hearts Foundation

for a period of four months starting from 3rd August 2021 to 14th December 2021. Furthermore, a webinar on "Awareness around Disabilities and Education" was conducted on 11th December 2021, with the intention of creating a future generation that will not waver in the face of obstacles.

Unseen Harmonies:

This was a Christmas Carol service performed by a group of outstanding visually impaired people in honor of the December holiday season with the secondary intention of collecting funds for the well-being of the said group of people. On the 17th and 24th of December, Unseen Harmonies took center stage at three separate venues: One Galle Face premises, Odel (Alexandra Place), and Colombo City Center, respectively, where funds were collected through a donation box placed near the choir. The cash that was collected during the events was given to the choir right at the end of the performance with the hopes of helping them through the difficult times they had to endure post-pandemic period.



Spotlighting

As the final element of Andurata Athwalak, "Spotlighting" was introduced. This is an event for the disabled entrepreneurial women to promote and sell their own products in commemoration of World Women's Day. The event took the spotlight in Colombo City Center on the 13th and 24th of December March.



Ultimately the project Andurata Athwalak was able to increase the opportunities presented for the disabled community through the development of skills and providing more chances to the disabled youth with their entrepreneurial endeavours.

3. Connecting the Dots

Connecting the Dots was a massive initiation under the avenue that focused on cultivating peace, unity, and coexistence among various communities and building long-lasting friendships among the Sri Lankan brethren of different creeds that we pressingly need today. In line with four SDG goals and three of Rotary's main focus areas, the project revolved around two main subprojects. These projects, namely Vanakkam and Shalom, addressed the different nationalities and cultures of Sri Lanka.

Shalom

'Shalom' was conceptualized with the aim of lending a hand to the Catholic students and their families in the city of Negombo with the help of the project's partnering organization, Big Hearts Community.

The project consisted of a few phases, where during the first stage, our Rotaractors, along with 'Big Hearts Community' coordinators, paid a visit to the community to get a deeper understanding of the needs of the people living in the town of Negombo. The team was able to meet a number of families, out of the 40-45 families the project aimed at, and carry out open discussions. The members were forthcoming with their present situations, their needs, and hopes for their younger generation and accommodated the team's questions amicably.



The next step of the project aimed toward laying the foundation for future educational endeavors with the students involved. On the 1st of April 2022, an informative and friendly introductory session was carried out for the students who are to be seated for the G.C.E Ordinary Level (O/L) examinations at the St. Sebastian's Church convent during the year's end. Approximately 20 O/L students participated in the session. Co-director Community Services Rtr. Bawun Mawitagama and the Co-founder of the Big Hearts Community Mr. Navindra Fonseka warmly welcomed the students and then had an icebreaker session along with a friendly conversation in order to get to know the students well and help them voice out their thoughts. The students were then divided into two groups

and each one of them was guided by our rotaractors and the coordinators from the organization.

Vanakkam

The second initiative of Connecting the Dots, "Vanakkam" focused on the community in Jaffna and was done in collaboration with Rotaract Club of Nallur Heritage. Since education has been identified as a driving force for sustainably promoting peace and reconciliation, project Vanakkam is structured to create opportunities for better education for the students in Jaffna. The project plan was to find an underdeveloped school in Jaffna, identify the



needs of the school, and provide sustainable solutions. After conducting research and a feasibility analysis J/ Muththuththampi Maha Vidyalayam located in Thirunelveli was selected to implement the project.

Vanakkam addresses two requirements of the school. The first one was to equip the school's science laboratory with necessary chemicals, lab equipment, and apparatus to make the science lab functional for the students to perform science experiments enlisted and recommended in their curriculum. The second requirement was building an indoor sports facility. Since the school already possesses sports equipment but not a proper arena for sports practices, it was decided to renovate an existing building as an indoor sports facility. Due to the developing uncertainties in the country, the team could not complete a proper site visit. Assuring the safety of the Rotaractors, the implementation of the plan was decided to be taken forward to the next year, where there is also ample time to raise adequate funds for the project.

4. Grama Prabodhaya

"Grama Prabodhaya" is a concept that energizes and supports rural towns in Sri Lanka which are in critical requirement of assistance and creating them into self-sustaining units. It is not a mere community benefit venture with the concept of material donation, but a collective exertion to create a village comprehensively in numerous angles to elevate the quality of life of the villagers.

The Rotaract year 2021-22 was an important juncture for Grama Prabodhaya as the team had to embark on a new chapter of the initiative to empower the community of a new underdeveloped village.

Selecting the most deserving location with potential was the most crucial aspect that had to be focused on during the year. After thorough research, out of three shortlisted areas from three distinct districts, the rural village of Dikhena located in the Kaluthara district was selected for

the initiative. The village revolved around many fundamental issues both adults and children face. Most villagers were employed in tea plantations, hence many families were unable to afford technical devices to get connected to the internet, although it has become an inevitable necessity due to the Covid-19 situation in the country. Further, according to the data that was collected, the cellular signal strength of the area was very weak, the school had limited teachers, and the unavailability of the necessary classrooms on the school premises, imposed hurdles for the students to be engaged in their educational activities.

After months of carrying out community awareness and discussions with the relevant personnel in the village, the team has laid the foundation needed for the project. The learnings have already been transferred to the incoming team, with them already in discussion about plan for Grama Prabodhaya for term 2022-23.

5. Hand in Hand

Hand in Hand is an approximately ten-year-old project that was started to help children at Apeksha Hospital in Maharagama who were struggling for their lives. It is aligned with Rotary's Area of Focus, 'Disease prevention and treatment.'

Fundraiser

Every year, more than 300,000 children are diagnosed with cancer around the world and approximately 8 in 10 of these children live in low and middle-income countries like Sri Lanka where their survival rate is only 20%. With Sri Lanka facing the worst economic crisis of the century, the unavailability and unaffordable medications and relevant medical equipment due to inflation too have negatively affected the patients, hence there's more dependency on funds and donations.

RotaractMora unveiled a fundraiser to generate funds for cancer-stricken children. Primarily, the fundraising campaign was conducted through three main phases; Christmas Sticker Phase, T-Shirt Campaign, and Vesak Card Phase where the stickers and cards are designed with beautiful drawings by children residing at Apeksha Hospital.

The [official website](#) of Hand in Hand was updated to provide a better knowledge of Hand in Hand to the

general audience.

Furthermore, integrating an online payment gateway into the website to facilitate payments directly from donors via the internet is currently in progress.

With the decrease of the prevailing Covid - 19

pandemic in the country towards the later part of the year, and while abiding by all health guidelines, the **Christmas Card Campaign** was successfully held at the BMICH Colombo Shopping Festival from 18th to 22nd December 2021 for 5 consecutive days with the participation of 45 volunteers from our club. Furthermore, the **Vesak Card Campaign** was held from the 07th to the 11th of April where funds were raised by selling cards and stickers.



As a means of raising more funds, in March 2022, the **T-Shirt Campaign** was arranged to target the batches of 2020 and 2021 of our university, whose contributions were valued. In comparison to the previous year's T-Shirt Campaign, this year we were able to sell more than 600 t-shirts, each for Rs. 1500. The team's efforts in supervising the project during one of the most difficult years for the project are noteworthy and should be recognized. We were able to hold the cards selling campaigns while adhering to all safety procedures and health rules, which resulted in a significant increase in funds and donations.

Colours

"Colours" originally organized to spend a day with child cancer patients at Apeksha Hospital, had to be substituted with an online competition as the hospital administration did not permit outsiders to visit the hospital premises for safety measures. With 150+ submissions of artwork on the topic of cancer awareness, the competition successfully concluded, bringing

awareness to the project as well as enhancing the digital reach of the Hand in Hand website.

Save Your Goodbyes

In order to further raise awareness of cancers in Sri Lanka, the webinar, "Save Your Goodbyes" was conducted on the 31st of October 2021 in collaboration with the National Cancer Control Program, which served as the Knowledge Partner for the webinar. The webinar was conducted with the guest speakers Dr. Upuli Perera and Dr. Suraj Perera, Consultant Community Physicians at National Cancer Control Program where they enlightened the audience on how to diagnose cancer at early stages. With a virtual audience of 75+ participants, the informative webinar successfully concluded by raising awareness on the vicious silent killer of Cancer.

All in all, Hand in Hand plans to continue its purpose to be a hope and relief for the brave cancer patients residing in Sri Lanka, with the plans to extend the fundraising campaign and awareness through similar events in the years to come in a more effective manner.

6. Nena Aruna

The noble signature Community Services project 'Nena Aruna' is organized with the goal of improving the educational standards of underprivileged schoolchildren while giving them an equal opportunity to participate in their studies during the new normal. The project's first phase was primarily focused on students doing A /Levels in the academic year 2021.

The **Nena Aruna Seminar Series** is the project's first component, where the series had to be conducted entirely through the Zoom Video Communications platform, due to the presence of the ongoing COVID-19 Pandemic situation. The first virtual seminar in the series was held on September 13, 2021. Students from all around the island were invited to join the virtual lectures presented by the dedicated Rotaractors by joining the WhatsApp groups that were set up. Making the plans a reality, the Nena Aruna community of students grew day



by day, emphasizing the quality of classes delivered by our members. Following that, 51 seminars for the main A/Level topics, namely Combined Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Accounting, Economics, and ICT, were held in September and October.

The value of these virtual seminars is that each session had an average attendance of more than 50 students,

with the majority exceeding 70 participants. The Nena Aruna team always ensured that the aforementioned seminars would be conducted in an interactive manner in which students felt comfortable enough to unmute themselves and direct questions even at the end of the sessions to explain their uncertainties. Overall, these seminars attracted participants from all four corners of the country, and it is worth noting that the seminars met their intended purpose in terms of audience reachability for the project. At the same time, the Rotaractors always

uploaded the recorded session to the [Nena Aruna YouTube channel](#) and helped it reach 1000 subscribers, which is currently still growing.

In addition to the foregoing, the 'LearnYou' platform was used to help students explain any questions they had about the subject matter.

8. Suwaliya

Project 'Suwaliya' was brought forward by Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa together with Rotaract Club of Faculty of Medicine, University of Colombo to focus on the needs of this vulnerable population and empowers and provide the necessary support for girls living in orphanages.

After a community assessment among the target audience of Rotaractors and Interactors regarding sexual and reproductive health, a series of webinars were conducted by some of the experts in the field: Dr. Prabodhana Ranaweera, Consultant Obstetrician and Gynecologist - about adolescent reproductive health, and Dr. Nilanka Wickramasinghe, Senior Lecturer of the Department of Physiology, Faculty of Medicine, University of Colombo - about adolescent nutrition and physical health.

Based on the information collected via the survey and webinars, a booklet was publicized including the topics such as puberty, sexuality, contraception, LGBTQ+ awareness, and adolescent nutrition.

Afterward, a donation campaign was conducted, commemorating Women's Day, to provide orphaned adolescent girls with the basic necessities to maintain



proper hygiene and improve their quality of life. A donation of 'dignity kits' which contain items such as sanitary napkins, soap, toothpaste, etc. was provided along with the pre-recorded webinars regarding sexual and reproductive health. For this phase, Suwaliya partnered with Arya+ to obtain the sanitary napkins needed for the dignity packs. In total, over 1400 sanitary

napkins were donated to the 'Sri Lankaadhara Society' and the 'Ceylon Moor Ladies' Society'.



Suwa Kekulu

The final phase of project Suwaliya was the development of a mobile application called 'Suwa Kekulu'. The main aim of this was to empower mothers to improve their

knowledge of health, be aware of the importance of maintaining the CHDR, and better take care of themselves and their children. This app was useful to monitor development, growth, nutrition, and immunization, and it provides necessary knowledge concerning various aspects of the health and well-being of a child under the age of 5 years. This is a user-friendly and reliable application validated by the Family Health Bureau owing to the efforts of Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa.

The launching of the "Suwa Kekulu" app was held on the 31st of May 2022, together with a health guide for teenage girls, an illustrated short story "You Can Fly" and the most integral component of the initiative, the donation of the dignity packs to Amana Banks Orphan Care.

TEAM MESSAGE



The International Service Avenue of RotaractMora comprises all a Rotaractor can do to promote international understanding, goodwill, and peace by learning about people from different nations, their cultures, customs, successes, goals, and even problems. Looking back at the last Rotaract Year as the International Service Avenue team of RotaractMora, we can be proud of what we did and how we improved people's lives not just in local communities but also in international communities.

Essentially, the International Service Avenue executes projects in two major aspects: **International Service and International Understanding**. International Service comprises going outside our geographical boundaries to make a difference and help the international community, whereas International Understanding entails sharing cultures and developing mutual cultural understanding. **This year, our primary focus was on international service**, and we went on to clearly establish the vision and mission for the avenue in order to organize our year plan to achieve our stated goals and objectives. As a result, throughout this Rotaract year, team IS was able to effectively plan and implement a variety of initiatives in order to accomplish all of the aforementioned objectives while collaborating with a number of international Rotaract Clubs.

As per the avenue's mission, the context and necessity of the initiatives we undertook revolved primarily around assessing and satisfying needs in our international community for service to our fellow world citizens, with a focus on humanitarian projects. As a result, Project **'Boon Digiti'** was initiated as the year's signature International Service project, allowing us to take a significant step towards a meaningful and long-term international service project.

This project improved foreign students' IT skills and gave Rotaractors various possibilities for pursuing their enthusiasm for global social actions. By cooperating with the Rotaract Club of Mwenge Catholic University, we were

able to use cutting-edge technology to promote education and provide world-class knowledge to around 3000 students and 50 teachers in under-resourced areas of Tanzania. With Phase 1 done, we are currently in the process of developing a website for the project as Phase 2 in order to reach out to other international communities beyond Tanzania. As RotaractMora, we are ensuring that this project is not only meaningful but also sustainable in terms of international aid in the following Rotaract years. Thus, 'BOON DIGITI' was indeed a success which provided society with a better knowledge of how Rotaract movements contribute to the welfare of the International Community and how they are always put into action when needed.

One of the most significant developments in the IS avenue this year was the introduction of 4 physical projects for the first time in RotaractMora's history, rather than confining ourselves to the online platform.

As a result, after a series of sub-projects meant to address the development of one or many essential qualifications anticipated from a delegate in order to groom the participants into the best form of delegates, the culmination of **RMMUN, Sri Lanka Rotaract Model United Nation (SLRMUN)** unfolded on its maiden voyage as a hybrid Conference facilitating **40+ local participants and 25+ international participants from 10 countries** and making the effort to share the message of a global village unitedly developing each other's own communities with the support of RotaractMora.

RMMUN is unique from other MUNs as we put what we debate about and our researched ideas into action, which is not often seen in other MUNs. Going several steps forward from the standard skill development of the delegates of SLRMUN, RotaractMora made RMMUN innovative and impactful by initiating yet another physical International Service Project to serve both local and international communities under the main project as a joint collaboration with Rotaract Club of San Francisco, Philippines, and Interact Club of Sofia Centre, Bulgaria. Not limiting its service to Sri Lanka, RMMUN was able to render its service on a global level, serving 3 different countries serving more than 400+ students and additionally benefitting 50+ teachers with **'Cognizant'**.

"Ceylon Safari" an authentic expedition which encapsulates the magnificent isle of Sri Lanka in ten memorable days in order to execute an adventure of a lifetime came back to life, stronger than ever after a

hiatus of two long years due to the Coronavirus outbreak. What's more remarkable is that despite the current crumbling economic crisis in the country with soaring inflation rates, daily peaceful protests, blackouts and a continuous fuel shortage, the project successfully secured 3 participants from 3 distinct foreign countries.

Successful **Twin Club Agreements** are crucial in the IS Avenue because they set the way for collaborating with a foreign Rotaract club under mutual understanding to find answers to significant bilateral concerns and difficulties shared by our communities. This year the IS team had a fantastic year with the twin club agreements and made new acquaintances with the Rotaract Club of Yala, Nepal and the Rotaract Club of San Francisco, Philippines. As a result, we initiated projects such as **'Dusty Paws'** and **'Imahe'** with international service elements as a service to the communities followed by cultural exchange projects that improved our fellowship between the clubs and the international understanding of club members of RotaractMora.

International Service exemplifies our global reach in promoting peace and understanding. As a result, strengthening our club members' international understanding was never something to be overlooked by us. **'World Peace Day Celebration,' 'Co-Mingle,' 'Experience Festivals Better' and 'Melody Exchange'** are some of the initiatives undertaken for this purpose.

Developing and maintaining good interrelationships with foreign Rotaract clubs is also one of the key objectives of the International Service arm of RotaractMora. Keeping that in mind, **"TourEye: Virtual Tour"** event was instituted in celebration of World Tourism Day. At a time where the global pandemic has forced everyone to stay inside; where you can only resort to thinking and dreaming

about travelling overseas; RotaractMora hosted TourEye in collaboration with 5 different foreign Rotaract Clubs; to deliver a sense of the true and authentic feel of travel and bring the hidden wonders of each country to everyone's screens. TourEye was one of several initiatives that proved the need of creativity and imagination in achieving success.

Although the current pandemic crisis made this year difficult for the avenue, we at the International Service Avenue were able to turn it to our advantage. Ensuring the achievement of 10 Sustainable Development Goals and 6 Rotary Focus Areas, the International Service Avenue was able to reach more different communities locally and internationally as beneficiaries of the initiatives than ever before. Thus, Team IS was able to successfully conclude the year, making it the most successful year in the avenue's history with 16 projects and interactions with over 200+ Foreign Rotaractors in 22 different Rotaract Clubs and 1 Interact Club in 16 different countries across 5 continents.

Finally, we would like to express our gratitude and appreciation to all of the committee members that contributed to the avenue's success throughout the last Rotaract year. Furthermore, we are grateful to all of the international Rotaract Clubs who collaborated with us for their significant contribution to the effective completion of the projects we undertook. Finally, and most significantly, we are grateful to the Board of Officials and the President of RotaractMora for their steadfast support and direction in achieving yet another outstanding and successful year in the club's history.

Being the first ever university-based Model United Nations in Sri Lanka, RotaractMora Model United Nations (RMMUN) is held as the signature project of the International Service Avenue of RotaractMora for the year of 2022. Held through a massive span of 07 subprojects, RMMUN was the perfect opportunity for all beneficiaries to explore new knowledge as well as territories, create bonds through fellowship, building leadership and other important qualities all while serving our community in a number of different ways.

The Annual Sri Lanka Rotaract Model United Nations (SLRMUN) Conference is the pinnacle of Project RMMUN, when participants unite as delegates from their allocated nations to engage in relevant conversations about critical problems and debate on behalf of their country. As a result, there was a series of sub-projects meant to address the development of one or many essential qualifications anticipated from a delegate in order to groom the participants into the best form of delegates. Furthermore, there were a few other subprojects to put what we debated about and our researched ideas into action. These subprojects were; Covenant, Peace Day debate, UN days, Colloquium, Congrego, Cognizant and SLRMUN Conference.

Covenant



Covenant was a competition that created a platform for the delegates to conduct research on one of the given topics related to recent ongoing global crises. Helping in gathering participants for RMMUN while familiarizing the practice of MUN within the University led the project into forming a steady foundation for the final leg, i.e., the SLRMUN Conference. This subproject also helped generate feasible project ideas and innovations for ongoing club projects where we identified world crises, presented solutions including media forms and thereby planned to implement the proposed solutions during the Rotaract year.

Aligned with the project based on projects of Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa, 'A Beacon for the Blind' (aligned with projects Manusath Handa and Andurata Athwalak), 'X-press Pearl Disaster: The monstrous disaster that hit the Sri Lankan Coastline' (aligned with projects Pearl Pacify and Zooxanthellae), and 'A Terrorism-free World' were selected as the topics of the competition. After a well conducted research process covering all intricate factors regarding the issue, the participants had to submit their findings and report in a creative manner in either the form of a PowerPoint presentation, a creative speech, or creative writing. Both group and individual participation were open for current undergraduates of the university as well as students who had secured their spots in the university following the 2020 G.C.E. Advanced Level Examinations. Three winners under each topic were announced, with their solutions for the given issue areas were directed to the respective Avenue in RotaractMora for implementation.

Colloquium

This subproject is an informative implementation where a team of dedicated and talented individuals of RotaractMora created a YouTube video series giving a

comprehensive idea about MUN protocols to anyone on the internet. The video series were spread across a wide time span of 06 month giving both local and foreign participants time to prepare for the SLRMUN conference well in time. Consisting of a total of 11 published videos, this subproject gave the viewers a few tips to ensure their process of preparation for the conference was much easier. The most crucial and critical aspects of this preparation process were covered through the video. The United Nations devised its own rules of procedure to get things done in committee, whereas the Model UN also has a few key terms that need to be understood by delegates. Following this video series, anyone who is interested in starting their own Model UN journey can start at any level and catch up quite quickly on the crucial areas, which covers almost every aspect they need to know before going to a MUN conference. The series was well structured, and the content was prepared by MUN experts and most importantly we believe that it will serve as a comprehensive self-study guide for anybody interested in joining MUN in the future.

Congrego

This subproject was initiated to introduce MUN and MUN protocols to undergraduates at the University of Moratuwa and prepare them for SLRMUN RMMUN's flagship event as the MUN culture is something that is still being established within the university community as a relatively new concept to the context. Through this project the International Service team wished to familiarize the MUN culture within the university while also developing the undergraduates' skills in management, public speaking, debating, and writing so that they can direct themselves toward SLRMUN confidently.

All participants were divided into 08 groups with a trainer appointed for each one of them, where 05 training sessions were done with the participants of Batch 20 and 02 sessions with the participants of Batch 21. While learning about MUN, building skills in leadership, crisis management, public speaking, arguing, negotiating, writing and collaboration the participants were able to join in discussions about current crises such as Covid 19, Digital privacy, Climate Change, etc. From that, we were also able to find a number of great solutions for those crises which are hoped to be implemented in future Rotaract projects.

Peace Day Debate

A Debating Competition with international participants was held to commemorate the International Day of Peace, an UN-sanctioned day to respect and strengthen the values of peace. While this provided a forum for

participants from various countries to come together and demonstrate the true meaning of peace, it also served as an excellent practice debate for the delegates of SLRMUN'22.

The debate, which included participants from Nepal and India as well as local participants, focused on topics "Resolving and Achieving Long-Term Peace in the Gaza Strip Through the 2-State Solution," "Space Militarization as a Means of a Better National Defense Mechanism," and "Censorship of Information on the Internet for Security." Each team was assigned a mentor from team RMMUN to guide them through the process of the debate.

The preliminary rounds were held on September 25th, 2021, with competition judges who are representatives of MUN organizations at Richmond College and Ananda College in attendance. Their perspectives surely aided the participants in improving themselves and being much more prepared for the conference. The final round was held on September 30th with a panel of three judges, with the usual judges and a member of the Ananda College Debating Society, as the third addition.

Cognizant



What makes RMMUN unique is that it actively attempts to put our delegates' ideas into action. Always aiming to find solutions to current global and national issues, and we hope to continue doing so through projects of Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa. In commemoration of the International Day of Education, held on January 24th, "Cognizant," a sub-project of RMMUN, was launched in collaboration with Rotaract Club of San Francisco - Philippines, and the Interact Club of Sofia Centre - Bulgaria, with the goal of strengthening education as a public endeavour and common good, guiding the digital transformation, supporting teachers, and safeguarding the planet, and unlocking the potential in every person to contribute. The project was created as an educational webinar series to address three major subjects Mathematics, English and Robotics as well as guidance sessions where the value of education and the available

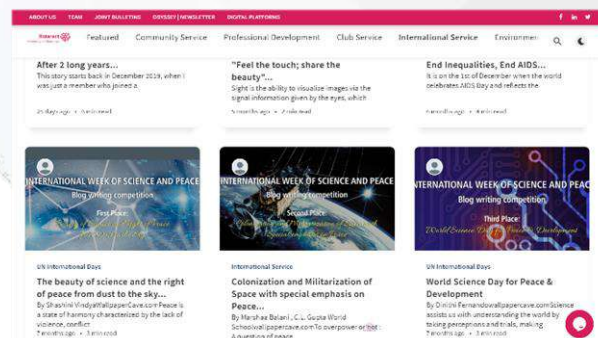
corporate fields were informed to both students and their parents.

In the local context, the educational sessions were held in schools outside of Colombo, where access to such programs is limited. The mathematics workshops, which were led by Dr. Udaya Jayathilaka, Senior Lecturer in Mathematics at the University of Moratuwa, were interactive and aimed to broaden students' thinking patterns. A mentorship program for parents was also organized, with Dr. Udaya Jayathilaka and Rtr. Bimsara Somaratna showcasing new learning opportunities with technology and how to use online education effectively amid the COVID epidemic. Our very own Rotaractors handled the English classes as interactive sessions that provided practical English learning. It also addressed the creative writing part of the language, with Rotaractors from both Rotaract Club of San Francisco and Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa preparing a distinct English handbook as a method of support for the students. Dr. Udeni Rosa, Director of West London College of Education, guided the development of the handbook. We were also able to introduce school students to Robotics for the first time as a part of the Cognizant project with the help of Circuit Breakers, who volunteered as teachers for the Robotics session. It was well-planned, with real-world electrical solutions that piqued the students' interest.

UN days

UN days is a series of informative and creative outlets to raise awareness among the university community and the public regarding the significance of international days. Under this subproject a Blog and Flyer series, a social media challenge and a blog competition was organised giving a platform to many talented creatives to showcase their work as well as everyone to be informed much more about this international importance. Following research conducted on each UN Day, multiple blog articles written by the Rotaractors which were published on the official club website. The documentary videos shared on International Day of Awareness of Food Loss and Waste, World AIDS Day, International Day Against Nuclear Tests etc. brought ample awareness on the topics.

Instagram challenges were established to raise awareness in a more modern approach. It was a successful attempt, with Rotaractors and young people from all around the world participating with much interest. On World Braille Day, Instagram users of all ages and genres were challenged to publish their names written in braille on their stories. This was able to garner



traction on a number of social media platforms. The Blog Competition was held in conjunction with the International Week of Science and Peace, which took place from November 9th to 14th.

Sri Lanka Rotaract Model United Nations Conference

RotaractMora focused on providing a platform for passionate individuals to discuss various global concerns such as poverty, climate change, injustice, and the global humanitarian crisis through the SLRMUN Conference, giving them an invaluable chance to share their experiences, encouraging foreign participation and school-based participation, and giving their voice a hearing platform at the same time. Consisting of 05 committees, namely United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund (UNICEF), United Nations Human Rights Council (UNHRC), The United Nations Security Council (UNSC), Social, Humanitarian and Cultural Committee (SOCHUM) and International Press Corps (IPC), the SLRMUN conference consisted of a total of 10 committee chairpersons and committee heads who were well experienced and expert MUN'ers.

Prior to the final conference online introduction sessions for each committee present for SLRMUN'22 as well as a practice debate was also held for the delegates of the conference to get more familiar with the proceedings on the final day. After the virtual preparation was done in favour of all participants, the conference flow was changed to follow the Ministry of Health's health rules and thus, held the club's second SLRMUN Conference as the first-ever physical SLRMUN Conference with virtual foreign and local participation, attempting the first-ever hybrid conference. SLRMUN'22 was held on March 26th with its own unique twist, as it was the first-ever university-based Rotaract Club to try the successful physical conference. With the immense contribution, dedication and passion of the secretariat board headed by the honorary Secretary General, SLRMUN conference was commenced in a fresh light with participants joining in physically as well as through virtual platforms.



Mr. Sachinda Dulanjana, a past Chevening Scholar (2020/21) at University of Edinburgh, a leadership trainer, former speaker of Sri Lankan Youth Parliament, and former Official Sri Lankan Youth Delegate to the United Nations, graced the closing ceremony to mark a successful conclusion to the second RMMUN Conference. SLRMUN seeks to provide all of our delegates with an educational experience that will be invaluable in their development as skilled and knowledgeable future leaders. The conference's most notable delegates were appropriately recognized for their efforts and were

awarded during the closing ceremony under the categories of 'Best Foreign Policy Statement,' 'Best Delegate,' 'Higher Commendation,' and 'Honorary Mention; and for their efforts, they were awarded during the closing ceremony under the categories of 'Best Foreign Policy Statement,' 'Best Delegate,' 'Higher Commendation,' and 'Honorary Mention; and for the IPC committee, they were appreciated under the 'Best Journalist' and 'Best Press Statement' categories.

As a result of RMMUN, we were able to develop our delegates into compassionate and smart young leaders capable of leading Sri Lanka into a brighter future. We also believe that their time as RMMUN delegates will help students develop their leadership, teamwork, communication, and problem-solving skills. We were also the first MUN to actively apply ideas and solutions for global issues, not just in Sri Lanka but also internationally. Everyone was on time for the daily poojawa after an enlightening adventure connecting all the dots behind the paintings of the temple.

Everyone relaxed at Puttalam Beach Park, with some much-needed icy ice cream. Wilpattu National Park hosted the first wildlife safari. The highlight of the day was seeing a rare leopard of Sri Lanka, which brought the hands-on wildlife safari experience for many first-timers to a close. Spontaneously, next, a sunset surprised everyone by the lakes of Wilpattu and stamped this magical day on the hearts of everyone.

Jetavanaramaya, the world's largest stupa, the majestic Ruwanweli Maha Seya, the Samadhi Buddha Statue, and the Anuradhapura Moonstone were all visited. A calm seat near Thissa Wewa recited a silent poem easing the weary passengers.

Then there came the bus ride to Habarana. Nobody knew Habarana had the best memories awaited them in the form of an elephant safari. Phase 3

3. Boon Digiti

"Boon Digiti" was a novel service project aimed to elevate the basic understanding of Information Technology (IT) among undergraduates of students and teachers in Tanzania. Even though ICT Training is considered a mandatory subject according to the Tanzanian Education policy, due to the lack of resources, this is not implemented, giving rise to certain inequalities in the education system.

The project was done in collaboration with Rotaract Club of Mwenge Catholic University, RID 9214 as per the invitation extended to the foreign club. While the first

phase focused on imparting the IT knowledge to the members of Rotaract Club of Mwenge University, Boon Digiti expands its service with the two clubs intending to assist around 3000 students and 50 teachers in Tanzania in gaining the knowledge.

The organized syllabus for the project was carried out in 4 stages, where each concentrated on an introduction to computing and MS word, MS Excel, MS PowerPoint, MS Publisher, and Windows Installation. Owing to the geographical distance and the real-time differences, visual videos and PDFs on the subjects were released,

making it accessible to anyone on the internet. By the end of phase one, Boon Digiiti was successful in creating a video library of 31 informative videos within 4 months, along with continuous quizzes and assignments to evaluate their knowledge.



As per the subject matter undertaken as a part of the project, it will have a global reach in sharing revolutionary

knowledge that is both timely and visionary. Therefore, the University of Moratuwa, the leading technical university in Sri Lanka, adept in IT, had no second thoughts about initiating the project. The mission of this ongoing project is to join forces with ten more Rotaract clubs around the world.

Extending the scope of the project, Boon Digiiti hopes to launch a website and design more courses and publish them as the second phase of the project. This phase will further allow us to share our knowledge with African and South Asian regions.

By cooperating with the Rotaract Club of Mwenge Catholic University, we are able to use cutting-edge technology to promote education and provide incisive world-class knowledge to students in under-resourced areas. 'Boon Digiiti' provided society with a better knowledge of how Rotaract movements contribute to the welfare of the International Community and how they are always put into action when needed.

A well-developed website for any worthy cause is a necessity in today's day and age of information. IMAHE was initiated under the International Service Avenue as a joint project with Rotaract Club of San Francisco Philippines initially focusing on developing and launching their official Rotaract club websites. After several discussions, the project was planned to be carried out in two main phases.

In the first phase, Rotaract Club of Moratuwa lent a hand to Rotaract Club of San Francisco in developing and launching their club's official website. Being a recently chartered Rotaract Club under RID 3860, Rotaract Club of San Francisco had little digital presence. Hence, as the steppingstone of 'Imahe', the Official Website for Rotaract Club of San Francisco was launched with the guidance and assistance of the Digital Communications team of RotaractMora. It was a collaborative effort, where the members from RotaractMora dedicated their time and

effort towards helping the newly chartered club learn the technical know-how of developing the website during a time span of six months.

The second phase focuses on organizing a series of workshops for other Rotaract clubs in the Philippines region to elevate their knowledge of creating and managing a club website. With the aim of developing and maintaining good interrelationships with foreign Rotaract clubs, "TourEye: Virtual Tour" event was instituted in celebration of World Tourism Day. RotaractMora hosted TourEye in collaboration with Rotaract Clubs of Karachi Creators - Pakistan, Mwenge Catholic University - Tanzania, Pokhara University - Nepal, Plovdiv - Bulgaria, and Viman Nagar - India; to deliver a sense of the authentic feel of travel and bring the hidden wonders of each country to everyone's screens at a time everyone was stuck at homes due to the pandemic.

The tour covered spectacular, scenic, mind-blowing, splendid tourist attractions including St. Alexander Nevsky Cathedral, the National History Museum, the National Palace of Culture and Boris's Garden, Krastova Gora, Sarangkot Hill, Wilpattu National Park, Arugam Bay, Anuradhapura, Kilimanjaro National Park, Zanzibar Island, and Taj Mahal. The in-flight cultural items paved the way for the gathering to get a glimpse of the vibrant cultures of the countries and proved to be excellent conversation starters during the flight.

After the amazing tour, which was held on 26th September, on World Tourism Day that falls on 27th September, a video exchange was done with Rotaract Club of Yala, Nepal which was done to share the wonders of Sri Lanka and Nepal with each other. 6. Dusty Paws

Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa in collaboration with Rotaract Club of Yala, Nepal joined the cause of extending a helping hand to the strays in Sri Lanka as well as in Nepal by introducing the joint initiative 'Dusty Paws'. Alongside other organizations that take necessary action to support and accommodate stray dogs, Dusty Paws was brought to light with the aim of feeding these animals, treating their sicknesses, and improving their health condition and living environment. The project also conveyed a message of showing care and love towards stray dogs, out to society. The initial idea of Dusty Paws was for the two clubs to visit a dog shelter in their respective countries, feed them and spend quality time with them. However, to instill a greater impact through the project, it was then decided to feed stray dogs in the two countries and medicate them with the Amoxicillin tablet as a remedy for their skin infections.

With all the preparation done prior to the day, on the 26th of January, the team from RotaractMora assembled at one of the team member's residences early in the morning to prepare meals for the dogs. The plan of medicating the dogs with the Amoxicillin tablet was done by mixing it in the food that was prepared. The team then drove for over 3 hours and fed the dogs on the way. In the meantime, Rotaractors of Rotaract Club of Yala gathered in the town of Yala on the 21st of January. They too cooked

the meals and fed a large group of stray dogs that were there. As discussed by both teams, no polythene was used in the process.

Dusty Paws was successfully concluded, feeding over 70 hungry stray dogs in the vicinity of Ja-Ela town, Sri Lanka and Yala town, Nepal with their hunger fulfilled and our hearts fuller. They say, "it is painful to stay hungry and not be able to speak" and we as compassionate Rotaractors were able to help these voiceless victims and make their lives marginally better.

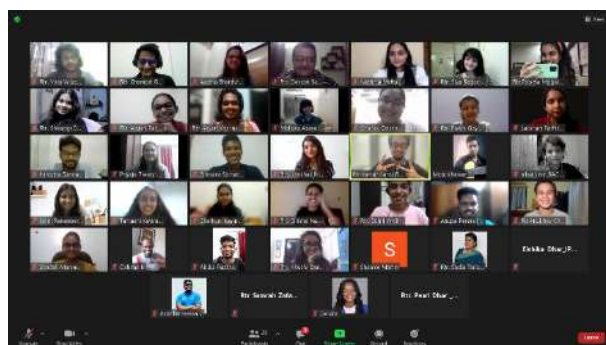
8. Melody Exchange

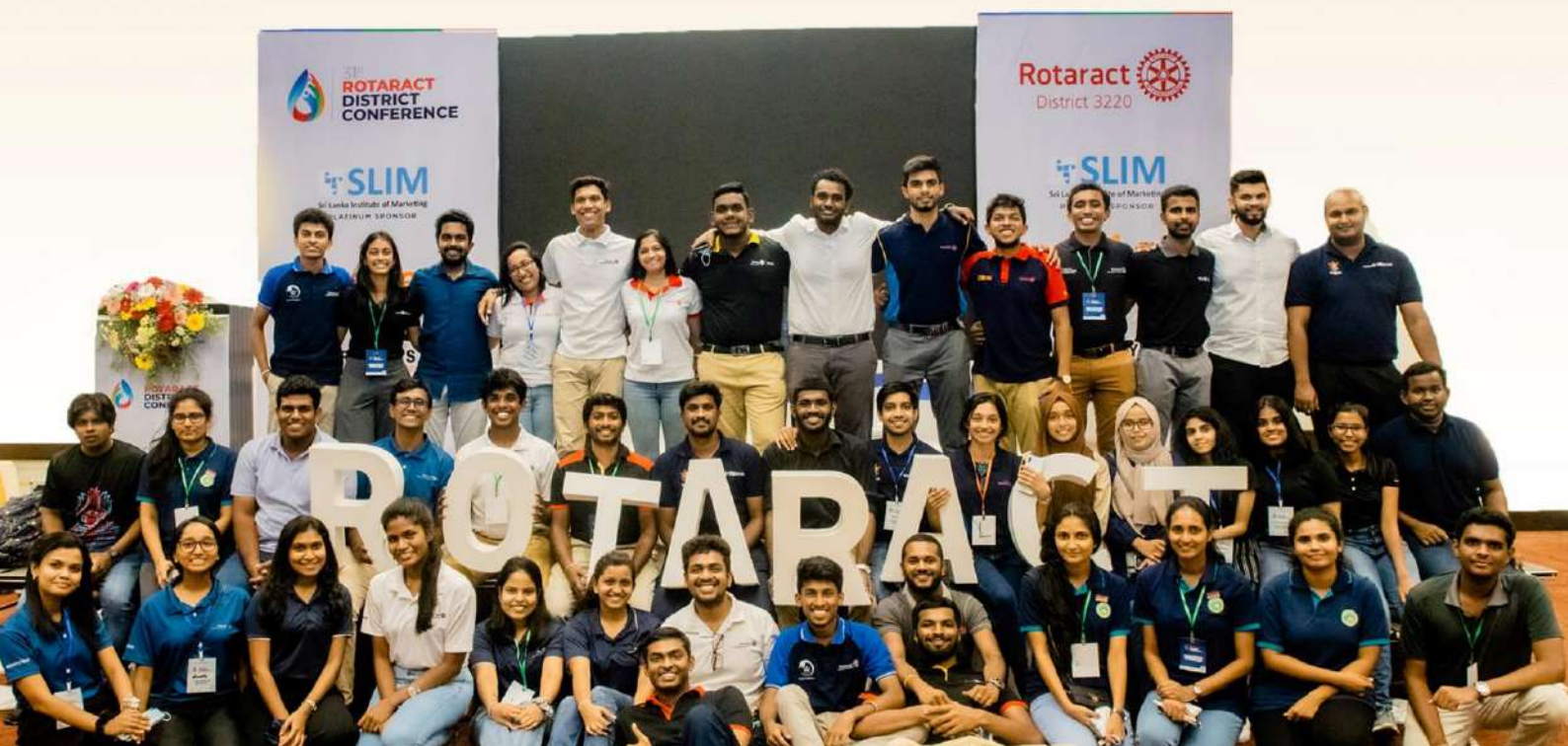

The Professional Development Avenue started penning its story for the 26th episode of the Rotaract Club of the University of Moratuwa with the hype passed down from the RI year 20-21. Thus from the very beginning, we determined to upscale the standards that have been already set there with the Professional Development Avenue.

Giving it a go, we all started drafting the upcoming year around the vision we defined;

“Grooming yourselves to the best versions with experiential learning”

To those who wonder what it means, we were deterministic to furnish our beneficiaries with experience to groom them in a professional context.

It all began with our first show, “**Catalyst ‘21**”, which became the board training program for the newly appointed board of directors for the term 21-22. The program, which spanned two weeks, had corporate personalities to groom the board of directors with profound leadership skills, insights on social media presence, communication etiquette, etc. Furthermore, we were able to bring in the PD team from the RD 3220 and familiarise the incoming board with the upcoming plans of the district.

Next up was the voyage on exploring youth entrepreneurship along with **Maestro**. When it comes to Maestro, it brings so much nostalgia for the four of us at Team PD 21-22. Since Maestro became the starting point of our journeys with the Rotaract movement back in the time when we were general members, the project was so close to our hearts. As RotaractMora has already written the story of this significant venture for three consecutive years, we thought of bringing in a novel component to its 4th episode, making it open for undergraduates worldwide. Thus we called it loud;

Maestro is going GLOBAL

Our attempt was successful with 32 teams aboard, while three teams were from Nepal, Guyana and India. Amidst all the hustle and bustle we had to go through, finding a knowledge partner given the critical condition of the country due to Covid'19, we were able to pull up the 4th chapter of Maestro in a virtual arena. The struggle we went through was real from June till December to bring Maestro'21 to a grand ending on a higher note.

Meanwhile, the storm revolved around Maestro; we made sure to step up for another initiative under the Professional Development Avenue – **MentHer**. MentHer is a mentoring program woven around the concept of women supporting women. As for a picture brought up by the PD Team for term 20-21, with immense pride, we thought to continue the program by expanding the scope to facilitate more girls. This time, we got 50 undergraduate girls from the university for the MentHer Class 2021, and ten female leaders from the industry were there to mentor them. Getting mentors aboard was a delightful task, as these corporate leaders were pleased to give us their warm hands. Adding on, this year, we were able to expand the context of the project by providing these mentees with group mentoring sessions and personalised one-on-one sessions. The demand from the undergraduates to enrol in the program assured us that we have to create more room to have more mentees and mentors next time.

Amidst all the hardships we had to face along with Covid'19, we didn't have a look back when moving forward with the set plans for the Professional Development Avenue for the term 21-22. Thus, we started planning the hotspot of the avenue; **Are You Ready 2021**. When it comes to Are You Ready, it won't be an exaggeration if we state it as one of the most significant events on the university calendar. RotaractMora held humble pride

hosting the official career fair of the university for the 26th consecutive years

in collaboration with the Career Guidance Unit of the University. This year as well, following the steps of the previous year, to deal with the global pandemic, we had to plan for a virtual career fair. When most companies had frozen their recruitment process, our team had a busy time getting aboard companies for the career fair. But as for the saying, “after every dark night, there is a brighter day,” all our hard work was paid off with 52

corporate companies aboard to run the show. Unfolding the digital lines across the country (million thanks to the IT team), we connected 1200 plus final year undergraduates with these companies facilitating more than 2000 job interviews and 400 plus one-on-one CV feedback sessions. Apart from these, the preparatory session we planned (Heads Up, The Forum and Career Insights Series) groomed the undergraduates with the exemplary skills to climb the corporate ladder. When reciting the story of RUR, it is refreshing to mention that amidst all the hardships our team had to undergo during the preparatory phase, when running the final show, the air was filled with so many cheerful vibes and lots of inside stories to mesmerise for a lifetime. All in all, we have to say that RUR'21, with lots of twists and turns, concluded by bridging the gap between job-seeking undergraduates and recruiters.

With so much energy put on Are You ready 2021, we still had more energy to run a few more shows and add more glamour to the 26th chapter of RotaractMora. Thus we started having discussions with OCTAVE from the JKH group to carry out the third chapter of **Data Storm**. To give a glimpse of the Data Storm, we may say it is an advanced analytics competition designed for data-enthusiastic undergraduates to tackle data sets at a corporate level. With masterclasses to prepare the delegates for the competition and data scientists from OCTAVE allocated as mentors for the teams, we were able to ensure the quality of the competition without failing to provide all the participants with a first-class experience and guidance in data-driven decision-making. Keeping aside the professional vibe for a moment, if we do not state that this was the point that taught us the beauty of a joint project, we are not being true to ourselves. The three-month-long journey we had along with Rotaract Club of Faculty of Science, University of Colombo planning and preparing for Data Storm, left us adding lots of new learnings to our plates and giving rise to lifelong new connections. In a nutshell, while grooming our delegates to deal with big data, Data Storm became a place for our team to understand and experience the beauty of fellowship.

That's not all for the term. From day one of the term 21-22, we continued The Scholar scholarship grant passed down from the previous year. In partnership with Mosvold Martinus Foundation, **The Scholar** is a financial aid we have extended to economically challenged first-year and second-year undergraduates at the university. For selected 50 undergraduates, we were disbursing a monthly stipend to cover their expenses for one year. The grant ended by March 2022 with

funding disbursement worth 2 million LKR

Without terminating this good deed at that point, we started conversations with the Mosvold Martinus Foundation to continue the scholarship for another set of undergraduates. With delight, we state; that currently, we are finalising the recipients of The Scholar's second phase, and hopefully, from July onwards, we will be able to distribute the fund.

Above all rounds up the story we, as the Professional Development Avenue, were writing with RotaractMora; but still, there are a few more takeaways to be shared with you all.

As mentioned initially, we kicked start the term with the vision of **"Grooming yourselves to the best versions with experiential learnings!"**; we were determined to achieve the set vision via **Training and Skill Development, Career Guidance and Personal Development**. Today as we are nearing the edge of this remarkable journey, we would say with no second thoughts,

YES, the journey was challenging yet immensely satisfying for all of us!

A year-long journey spanning our wings in 4 countries covering 22 universities, without a doubt, we say that we have reached every corner of the country. With 60 corporate partners, 220 plus corporate professionals and 10 academic professionals, we could impact more than 1800 individuals, thanks to the wonderful member base as volunteers, which consisted of 450 member contributions. Elaborating further on our journey, it comprises 11 completed projects, where Are You Ready, Data Storm, Maestro, MentHer, The Scholar, and Catalyst took the spotlight as signature projects of the avenue. Professional Development Avenue reflected 2 of Rotary's Focus Areas and 7 Sustainable Development Goals with all these stories.

If we are to comment on the future of Professional Development Avenue, we would suggest that our journey is substantial; still, it can be improved further by addressing the even better ifs of the path we have come across. Expanding the scope of MentHer even to address the male undergraduates ensuring gender equality, increasing the pool of scholarship recipients, thereby

addressing more economically challenged individuals, and familiarising the concept behind Data Strom among the school students in Sri Lanka are few of them. Also, we genuinely believe that this is high time for us to develop an initiative to address an unvoiced aspect under the avenue; maybe to groom the youth in rural villages with professional etiquette and vocational training.

In the end, the satisfaction we gained by setting goals and focusing on achieving our vision is surreal!

Making the final note, we would like to thank each one of you who got involved with us in writing our story adding lots of shades. If not for the sweet members we had, the partnering companies and the corporate and academic

professionals involved in our journey, we would never be able to make it to an exquisite destination like this. Finally, here we make our bow to Mr President and the Board of Officials for the consistent backing given throughout our journey.

As this rounds up the golden page the Professional Development Avenue added to the 26th chapter of RotaractMora, we wholeheartedly say that our legacy is forever to be continued!

1. Are You Ready?

'Are You Ready? 2021' was the Official Career Fair of the University of Moratuwa, held in collaboration with the University's Career Guidance Unit. It has expanded its scope of service over time, providing a platform for young and energetic undergraduates to build solid connections with corporate professionals. The purpose of the career fair was to bridge the gap between the undergraduate community and the corporate sector.

'Are You Ready? 2021' aimed to improve the undergraduate youth's professionalism and industry readiness. From November 11 to February 18, this revolutionary effort consisted of three preliminary sessions and one CV clinic program. In the event's centrepiece, the Flagship Fair, 2000+ interviews were conducted with 1200+ undergraduates onboard.

Heads Up

Emphasizing the importance of a CV, the virtual subproject of 'Are You Ready? 2021', 'Heads Up,' was created to provide an opportunity for University of Moratuwa 4th-year undergraduates to develop and maintain a proper CV when approaching the corporate sector. A curriculum vitae (CV) is a representation of a person's professional and personal qualifications. Because it introduces employees and establishes the first impression, a CV serves as a link between them and employers. Two well-known professionals in the industry from the London Stock Exchange Group (LSEG), Assistant Manager of Talent Acquisition, Ms. Sashini Konkaduwege, and Senior Executive from the same department, Ms. Nikeshala Samanthilake, facilitated the session that revolved around facing job interviews, brushing up LinkedIn profiles, and presenting a better CV.

The Forum

'The Forum' was a sub-project of 'Are You Ready? 2021,' which took place on December 22nd through Zoom and Facebook Live, with the goal of establishing a hub that

connects undergraduates to ever-changing professional prospects.

'The Forum' was a panel discussion that brought together some of the most influential corporate brains to examine the evolving prospects available in various industries. The target audience gained vital insight into overcoming obstacles, adapting to a fast-paced industry, and advancing up the ranks successfully.

Mr. Supun Weerasinghe, Group Chief Executive/Non-Independent Executive Director at Dialog Axiata PLC, Mr. Ranil Vitarana, Chief Innovation Officer and Chief Technology Officer at MAS Holdings, and Mr. Kulendra Janaka, Senior Product Manager, Multi-Asset Clearing Systems at LSEG Technologies, participated in the discussion as keynote speakers.

Resume Centre

The 'Résumé Centre' was established out of the development of 'Are You Ready? 2019?' The effort has generated a lot of interest in the process of reviewing each undergraduate's CV since its inception. 260+ undergraduates responded by submitting their CVs in a short amount of time, and the project was able to provide them recommendations on how to manage their resumes, such as how to alter the colour coding and what material should be included.

Undergraduates were given an average of 10-15 minutes to receive personalized feedback on their CVs. The 400+ one-on-one feedback sessions helped the students get feedback from the same professional who had looked through their CV.

Career Insights

As the third subproject of "Are you ready? 2021," "Career Insights" was conducted to let undergraduates grasp an idea of career opportunities available at top companies in the country and how to apply for vacancies. Diverse

firms have different departments that employ specific employees with different backgrounds. As a result, the criteria and qualifications for each job route are vastly different. When it comes to undergraduates looking for internships, the biggest challenge is a lack of literacy in these many divisions, as well as the enormous chances accessible at local businesses. Furthermore, some of them are left behind since they are unaware of the requirements required to compete in interviews.

'Career Insights' hosted a series of webinars in which several leading organizations were showcased in order to provide insight into the various job opportunities available. "Career Insights 2022" was able to not only inform young graduates about the numerous prospects available to them but also broaden their horizons in the corporate world.

Flagship Fair

The 26th edition of the Flagship Fair took place on February 15th, 17th, and 18th, 2022. Proceeding the attempt to change the University of Moratuwa's Official Career Fair, a fully virtualized career fair experience was offered for the candidates.

With 52 companies registered and over 1200 undergraduates on board, the companies were able to



conduct around 600 interviews each day and over 2000 total interviews during the process. The virtual conferencing software MS Teams was used for the interviews. The club's digital arm created the exclusive 'Are You Ready? Portal' to give candidates the best possible experience as a physical interview.

With 150+ first-year and second-year undergraduates at the University as the organizing committee, 'Are You Ready? 2021' lit up the career lives of the final-year undergraduates, which in return let these volunteers build solid connections with the corporate professionals. Even in difficult times, 'Are You Ready? 2021' was a massive success in building up a strong financial base which is an investment for the future of the club.

2. The Scholar

As the Sri Lankan state university education is free of charge for the selected students from the GCE A/L examination, students all around the country, regardless of their financial status, have the opportunity to have an undergraduate degree. Although university education is free of charge, a student has to bear a certain amount of expenses for food, clothing, traveling, communication, accommodation, electronic appliances, books needed for studies, etc. Due to this, the students from low-income families face a constant struggle to cover these expenses. While there are scholarship schemes such as Mahapola and Bursary, benefiting a majority of such students, there are limitations to these scholarship grants,

as there are still a considerable number of students who struggle to cover their expenses.

Addressing this limitation, RotaractMora stepped forward with the idea of "The Scholar", a scholarship programme to support the low-income undergraduates at the University of Moratuwa with the financial partnership from the Mosvold Martinus Foundation. Under the project, selected 50 students, 25 first-year undergraduates, and another 25 second-year undergraduates were carefully chosen and were given Five Thousand Rupee monthly installments for a period of ten months from February 2021 to March 2022. By the conclusion of the first phase of 'The Scholar', RotaractMora was successful in providing

scholarships worth Two Million Rupees, lighting up the paths of 50 fortunate undergraduates, and securing their futures.

From the grateful feedback from the scholarship receivers, it is evident that the scholars were able to get the maximum benefit out of the scholarships they were

granted. With discussions in progress with the Mosvold Martinus Foundation to facilitate another set of 50 undergraduates, 'The Scholar' came to an end for the Rotaract year 2021-22.

3. MentHer

Identifying the pressing concerns of gender-based discrimination in workspaces, especially in the job market in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) which is among the fastest-growing and best paid yet tend to be more discriminative against women, RotaractMora hosted "MentHer" for the second consecutive year. Being the leading technical university of Sri Lanka, University of Moratuwa and its brilliant female undergraduates face this issue in real life, which inspired the progressive individuals of RotaractMora to take up this initiative to uplift the tomorrow of female representation in the corporate field.

With MentHer, the participants were provided with an invaluable opportunity of joining a series of mentoring sessions with top female industry leaders in the Sri Lankan corporate sector today. Revolving around the prime concept of "women supporting women", the project helps in educating and encouraging the undergraduate women community at the University of Moratuwa to become leaders in the workspace one day.

After a step-by-step process of well-filtration, 65 enthusiastic female undergraduates of the university were selected as prospective mentees for the second chapter of MentHer. After dividing into 10 groups alongside an active lady Rotaractor at RotaractMora as the group coordinator, each group was assigned an industry female professional who was the mentor of the respective group of mentees. And these mentors were carefully handpicked covering the industries addressing the industry domains covered by the established faculties of the University of Moratuwa: Faculty of Architecture, Faculty of Business, Faculty of Engineering, Faculty of Information Technology, and the newly added

Faculty of Medicine. With the powerful and gracious participation of Ms. Pathmila Herath, Ms. Chathurika Geekiyanage, Ms. Vidumini Ranasinghe from LSEG Technologies, Ms. Imani Perera from John Keels Holdings, Ms. Mega Ganeshan from MAS Holdings, Ms. Bani Chandrasena from Diversity Collective Lanka, Ms. Namalie Siyambalapitiya from Road Development Authority, Dr. Rashmira Balasuriya from Kings Hospital, Ms. Vishaka Nanayakkara from the University of Moratuwa and Ms. Ridma Samaranayake from AMDT School of Creativity the project was implemented in three phases followed by a wrap-up session.



The inaugural and the introductory phase "Who We Are" was an opportunity to get to know each other well before the mentoring procedure began, where the mentors also had the chance of introducing short-term and long-term goals, and ambitions as well as identifying strengths and weaknesses within the group. In this phase, the mentees were also presented with Assessment 1 to map the insights gained from the discussions. Following that was the second phase "One Step at a Time" where discussions regarding future pathways the mentees can follow in order to achieve their dream careers were held after reviving the assessment 1. Here, the mentees had to identify their career goals and build up further

discussions. The third phase “Up Close and Personal”, consisted of one-on-one mentoring experiences for each individual mentee valuing the importance of individual feedback and evaluation. While growing their thinking through the Assessment II, here they were given the incredible opportunity of getting exposed to a “Personal Development Plan” (PDP) that summed up the mentoring experience and their own personal growth which helped them realize the importance of strengthening weaker areas they might have that may inhibit their ambitions but also focuses on the action steps that need to be followed to get there. Following that was the wrap-up

session “Look How Far We’ve Come”, where all conducted proceedings were reviewed, and the unsettled questions were brought up. The final individual feedback for all the mentees was also evaluated and put forth. Furthermore, ‘The Best Pitcher’ and ‘The Most Popular Team’ was preferred by the voting system which was held from 17th – 18th December 2021.

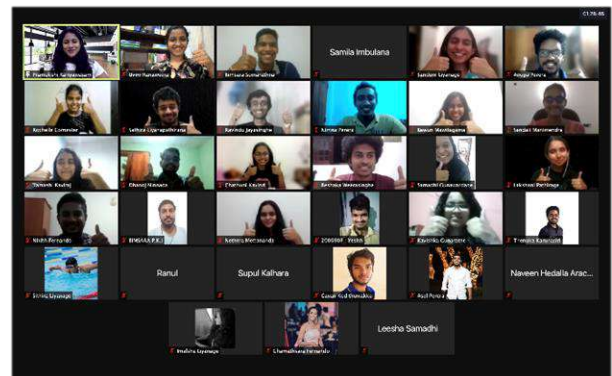

Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa holds a large number of projects within Rotaract year, with the immense support of the driving force behind the club, which is its general membership. Doing projects entails not only the execution of the tasks but also many things such as informing the audience, public relations, and technological aspects. A brand-new Professional Development project titled “Promethean” was launched with the goal of tackling the aforementioned sides, which are Designing, Editorial, and Information Technology. This included three different sub-projects: “Design Fest”, “Nexus”, and “Rethink”.

Design Fest

Design Fest was focused on flyer designing, video editing, and honing the skills of undergraduates in the areas of designing and editing. The workshop spanned across four days, where the first two webinars were dedicated to graphic designing while the other two were for video editing. On the 10th and 11th of December, the first half of the Design Fest was conducted by Mr. Diluk Chathuranga, the Creative Designer at IdesignVector and Content Creator of the DC Academy YouTube channel. The latter half was conducted by Mr. Deepal Gunathilaka who was a Senior Cameraman at an Independent Television Network on the 18th and 19th of December 2021.

NEXUS

NEXUS was a webinar series launched as the second sub-project of Promethean aimed at those who want to study Web Development. The ongoing pandemic crisis posed various barriers to making personal touch with individuals, as well as some issues for this project. As a

result, it was determined that the webinar series would be delivered via social media platforms, and hence, the NEXUS webinar was completely operational as a virtual event. The first webinar of the series was held on the 8th of October 2021, where it focused on front-end web development using basic web technologies. The second concentrated on front-end web development using frameworks and finally concluded with a webinar on back-end development with MySQL and Firebase/MongoDB.

Rethink

Contrasting to the above two project elements, Rethink took the form of an Editorial competition. The competition was established with the purpose of appreciating and recognizing the best writers among the newbies. Poetry and Creative Writing were the two categories of the competition. Again, there were two divisions for creative writing: movie review writing and short story writing. The project received more than 100 submissions, after which they were directed for an extensive review by Mrs. Osankha Rathnasiri, the Dean of the English Language Department at the University of Moratuwa. Following the evaluation, the winners and runners-up were announced, recognizing a classy number of newcomers who are prolific writers.

All three initiatives provided an excellent opportunity for skilled and fresh undergraduates to expand their previous knowledge while learning new things in order to transform themselves into better versions.

'Data Storm' was launched in the year 2020 with the goal of allowing young analytical minds to demonstrate their skills in the field of data analytics, as well as allowing industry experts to observe and assess the participants' potential. The unique feature of 'Data Storm,' and the reason it differs from traditional datathons, is that it demands participants to understand ways to deliver novel and feasible solutions to the given scenario, rather than only detecting patterns and links between the data presented.

Under the Professional Development Avenue, 'Data Storm' was organized for the third year in a row, with the driving force behind 'Data Storm 3.0' being John Keells Group, a powerhouse in the field of data analytics.

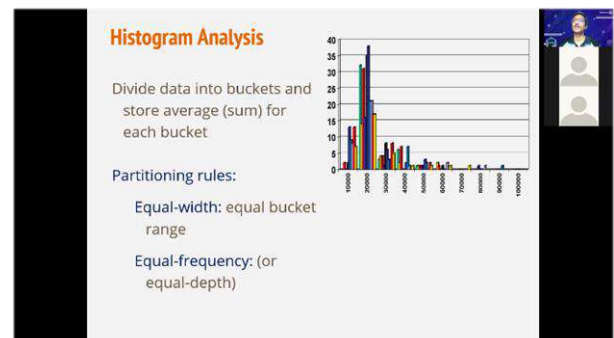
Introductory Webinar Series

The project began with an introductory webinar series that explained the fascinating ins and outs of data science to people with an interest in the area. Mr.Chalitha Perera, Former Data Scientist, Lead R & D Engineer at ArithmixAI, presented the first webinar in the series on the topic of 'What is Data Science and Career Opportunities' on the 7th of February, 2022. Participants were able to learn about AI, Deep Learning, and Machine Intelligence in general, as well as an introduction to Data Science and career prospects, throughout the session. A question-and-answer session followed the presentation to address audience concerns. On the 8th and 9th of March, two further webinars in line with the same webinar series were held. Dr. Amal Shehan Perera, Senior Lecturer at the University of Moratuwa, led the second introductory webinar on 'Data Cleaning, Pre-Processing, and Machine Learning Practices. Dr. Indika Gamage, resource person in Data Science, Computer Vision, Machine Learning, and Artificial Intelligence, led a session on 'Algorithm Selection and Machine Learning Practices' as the third and final introductory webinar.

Following this, registrations for Data Storm commenced. By the 23rd of March, the datathon secured more than 100 teams from state universities and private universities, giving it a promising start on its voyage.

Masterclass 1.0

While the registration procedure was in progress, a 'Masterclass 1.0' was conducted exclusively for the enrolled teams. The purpose of this workshop was to offer participants a basic foundation in Data Science and to help them perform better in the data analytics case. Important topics including what is Machine Learning, model selection, and metrics, as well as converting insights into action, were discussed.



Storming Round

On the 25th of March, the 'Storming Round' began. On the Kaggle platform, Following the Storming Round, the review process received 20 reports from registered teams. Due to the power interruptions and the current scenario, we have to extend the time for the contestants. The viewing procedure was examined by Dr. Upeksha Ganegoda, Dr. Ranga Rodrigo, and Dr. Chamira U.S. Edussooriya.

Masterclass 2.0

This was a session designed especially for the semi-finalists to help them prepare for the semi-finals by providing them with information on topics such as Sales

Forecasting and Regression, Modeling Methodology for Forecasting Sales, Over Forecasting, Under Forecasting, and Buffer Calculation.

Mr. Kiruparan Balachandran (Senior Data Scientist, OCTAVE - John Keells Group) and Mr. Anuk Dissanayake (Data Science and Engineering Associate, OCTAVE - John Keells Group) guided the semi-finalists by giving them a good grip on every detail that is important for the final round as resource persons for the session.

Data Storm received a Semi-finals Round earlier this year. The semi-final round was designed to increase the competitiveness of the competition. We were able to reduce the reduction in entries for this year's competition by giving the contestants greater prior experience in solving the case.

15 teams proceeded to the Semi-final Case Track of Data Storm 3.0 from the Storming Round. OCTAVE - The John Keells Group created an industry-level case study with a real-world problem for participants to solve. Binary Trio, Data Dreamers, Team Pan, Decision Makers, and Team Ares were chosen from a shortlist of five teams for the Grand Finale.

Grand Finale

The finale was held on April 9th, 2022, at 9 a.m. on the premises of DHPL, Nawam Mawatha, Colombo 7. The

comprehensive case study and data set were released at 9.15 a.m., giving four hours to work on the case and to submit the presentation slides. The Pitching Round, which determined who would win the Grand Finale of Data Storm 3.0, started at 1.30 p.m. on the same day. Two teams competed virtually, while the remaining teams competed



in a Pitching Round at the venue.

Following a month-long journey, the Data Dreamers have been crowned as the victors of Data Storm 3.0. After a tough battle, Team Pan and Binary Trio came in second and third, respectively. The tournament was a big success, demonstrating to the rest of the globe that Data Science-driven innovation and technology can be game-changing.

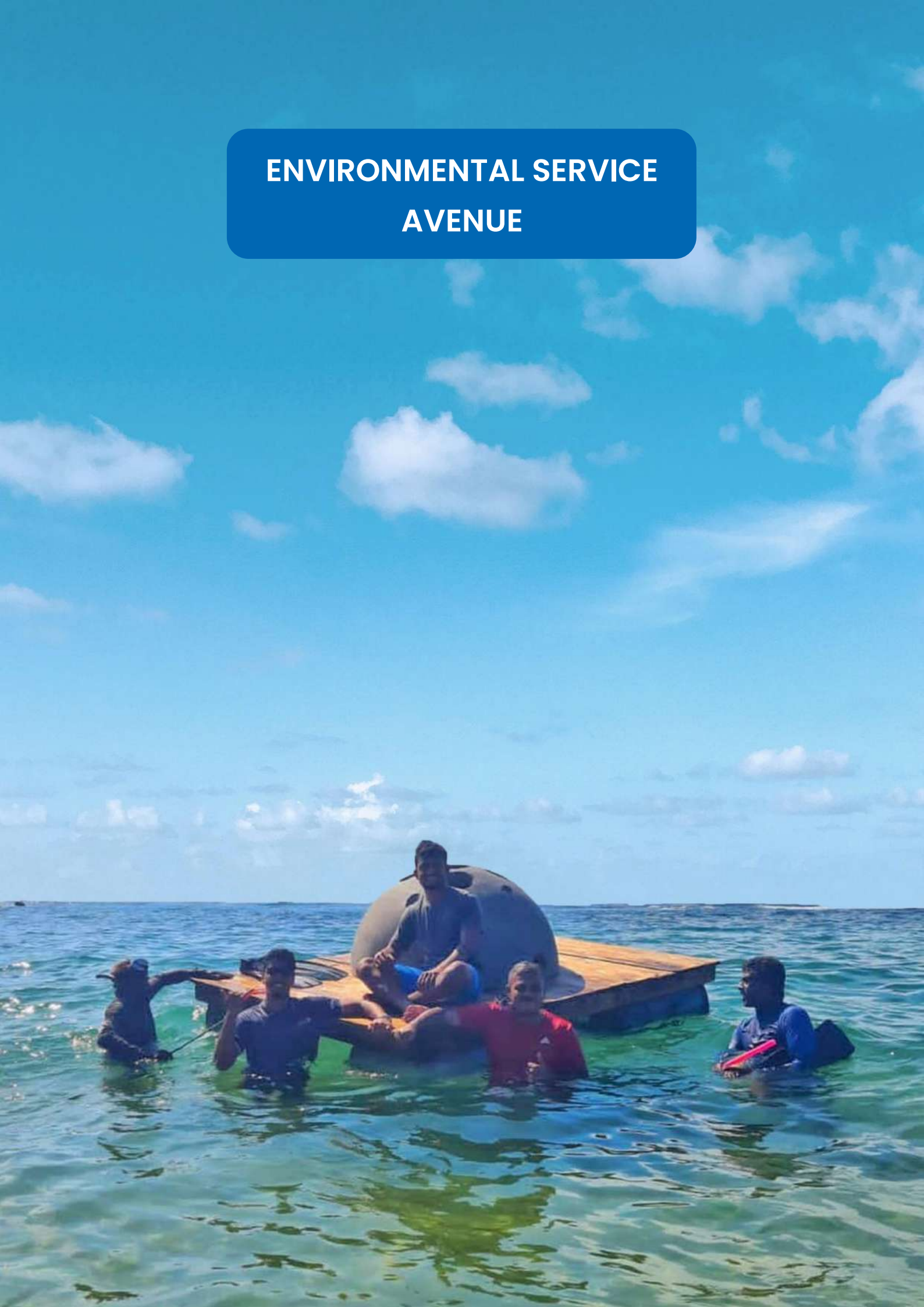

TEAM MESSAGE



Since the very first moment we inhale the very first breath in this world, mother nature has got our back holding our hands, walking with us, breathing with us to protect us from every danger and holding that pen for us to write our own story. But during this lifetime we get very limited opportunities to give back to mother nature amidst our busy schedules.

As pioneers who get ready to be the change that they desire to see in the world, Environmental Services Avenue of Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa, always strive to fulfil its duty to team up and inspire others to do their part to protect mother nature. The year 2021-22 started off having another set of projects on the drawing board which were yet to be executed redefining the avenue. We opened the doors of the avenue to the year holding three main aspirations which were restoring ecosystems, creating ecosystems and inspiring environmental enthusiasts. After an era stuck inside the virtual context, with the beginning the avenue has noticed a shadow of the potential to step on to the ground and serve nature. Likewise, projects such as Zooxanthellae, Urbanscape, Woof Roof, Grove Green and Clean SL came into life representing a vast variety of environmental aspects we should consider and conserve.

The Spotlight of Environmental Service Avenue held by project **Zooxanthellae**. Zooxanthellae was carried out throughout the year planting coral fragments in the southern coastal seabed and taking necessary provisions to establish the sustainability of the restoration of coral reefs. The first phase of the project carried out using specifically designed concrete boulders, designed by the undergraduates of University of Moratuwa. The Mirissa seabed was decorated by attaching 100+ coral fragments to 20 concrete boulders. Moving on to the second phase shallow seabed near the Kamburugamuwa, Matara was chosen as the location for the coral transplantation with another different set of boulders. With the awareness sessions Zooxanthellae handed over the responsibility of protecting the built coral kingdoms to the locals, especially the future generation.

Conducting beach cleanups, we took actions to secure the coastal ecosystem for the growth of corals, and also conducting continuous monitoring sessions we took actions to ensure the growth of it. Leaving many more pages to write stories of these unsung warriors in the ocean, Zooxanthellae 21-22 concluded its voyage with the conclusion of the Rotaract year.

To introduce a greenery environment to the urban setting, finding solutions to critical issues raised in polluted urban areas, project **Urbanscape** joined the parade of Environmental Service Avenue. With Urbanscape, we revealed many tips on utilizing the less space in an affordable manner to create your own tiny garden beautifying your environment and purifying your atmosphere. The initiation of the project brought into spotlight through social media pages and webinars spreading the knowledge and awareness. Without stopping right there, project Urbanscape took a higher step developing urban gardening settings in a public area. Initial steps were taken designing a structure for a "Grow Room" and conducting surveys to find suitable locations. Concluding the planning stage of creating a leafy habitat, it is now in safe hands to bring it out to a physical context.

Lending our hands to innocent street pooches on the road who are unable to voice out their feelings and needs, **Woof Roof** came on the stage of Environmental Service Avenue, for the second consecutive year. Woofy's Competition grabs the attention of many by sharing differently captured beauty of street dogs and digital arts related to the world of street dogs. The project concluded taking necessary provisions to conduct street dogs vaccine programs and adoption days in the coming years.

Year 21-22 started by the Environmental Service with the intention of restoring many eco ecosystems. Fulfilling the aforementioned goal, for the regrowth of the mangrove ecosystem, we initiated project **Grove Green**. Along with awareness sessions, Grove Green was brought into life at Hikkaduwa planting 250+ mangrove plants, with the help of many enthusiastic volunteers. While developing the mangrove ecosystem, Grove Green paved the way for the development of tourism and fishery industry in the area.

As a host club, Environmental Services Avenue of RotaractMora, joined hands with project **CleanSL** to minimize the amount of mismanaged plastic released to the water bodies. Apart from awareness sessions and installation of trash traps, we introduced underwater clean-up which could collect more than 500kg of trash

with the participation of 100 Rotaractors along with beach clean-ups. CleanSL was another venture we carried out which could pave ways to explore and give back to nature.

Environmental Service plays a vital role not only in clubs but also in our lives as Rotaractors. This is a place where we are taught to exist as a human being, to be warm as a child of mother nature and to fulfil our duties as responsible, grateful citizens.

More initiatives, solutions to more environmental problems are yet to be generated and many stories on how we gave back to our mother nature under the shelter of RotaractMora are yet to be written. For the story we built

throughout the last year we are thankful to all the partners and sponsors who guided us towards success without leaving our hand. 1. Zooxanthellae

Understanding the importance of conserving the marine ecosystem entangled with the coral colonies, the project Zooxanthellae 21-22 was initiated with the aim of regrowing the coral colonies and raising awareness among the general public on the importance of the coral reefs and marine ecosystem.

By achieving the SDG, "Economic and community development", project Zooxanthellae partnered with Mitsubishi Corporation as the Exclusive Strategic Partner and the Marine Environment Protection Authority (MEPA) as the Exclusive Resource Partner.

Phase 01 – Mirissa

Under phase one of the Zooxanthellae 21-22, the cement structures were confirmed to deposit under the seabed as they aid the optimal coral growth. With the help of the MEPA, Mirissa beach, Matara was chosen to carry on the project. Nearby coral reefs are the heart of the local communities in Mirissa as they vastly depend on the tourism and local fishing industries. So, by launching the project in Mirissa, the project was able to achieve SDG 8, which is Decent Work and Economic Growth, and the Rotary focus area "Economic and community development".



The manufacturing of concrete boulders started off in September 2021 when 20 Concrete boulders were

manufactured according to the design and tests were taken to assure the quality of them.

In order to make the university undergraduates and the general public aware of what the coral reefs are and the ways they can be protected, a webinar, "Enlightener" was conducted on 30th October 2021 through the Zoom platform with Dr. Terney Pradeep Kumara who is a professor of Oceanography at the University of Ruhuna.



The deposition of the structures and the transplantation of the corals under Zooxanthellae 21-22 phase 01 concluded in January 2022, covering half of the square kilometers of the seabed at Mirissa, attaching 100+ fractured live corals (Acropora) to 20 concrete boulders specifically designed and structured.

Following the successful deposition and transplantation, an awareness session was conducted to the students at Bandaramulla temple, Mirissa in order to instill the importance of the coral reefs and the ways that they can be protected in their minds as they are the direct beneficiaries of the project. Even though the transplants were completed, continuous monitoring sessions are being conducted in order to ensure sustainable coral growth.

Phase Two – Kamburugamuwa

Preceding a triumphant deployment of the 1st phase at Mirissa beach, Matara, the 2nd phase of the project Zooxanthellae 2021-22 started off with the immense knowledge and experience gained from the previous phase. The shallow seabed near the Kamburugamuwa, Matara was selected to be the deposition location and has been currently ongoing from 20th May 2022 onwards with the aim of depositing specially designed 20 concrete structures and transplanting the baby corals on them.

Having gained national as well as international recognition, Zooxanthellae has been giving voice to the importance of protecting the corals and the marine ecosystem in Sri Lanka. With the active participation of Rotarians, Rotaractors, Interactors and the natives near the coastal line, their efforts will undoubtedly help the strong existence of the project, which in turn will bring them the benefits of making their coastlines yet another tourist attraction centrepiece.

Grove Green was initiated with the intention of restoring the Mangrove ecosystem in Sri Lanka. The project is centred on the one-of-a-kind building of a mutually beneficial link between mangrove forests and the surrounding communities. With the ultimate purpose of preserving the environment, the program aims to solve social and environmental issues when regenerating the mangrove ecology in a certain location.

Grove Green was carried out with the technical guidance of the Marine Environmental Protection Authority (MEPA) -

Galle District Office. The project focused on achieving SDGs, Climate Action, Life Below Water, Life on Land, and Partnership for the Goals. Furthermore, it covered Rotary Focus Area, Supporting the Environment.

The culmination of the project, mangrove restoration was executed in Hikkaduwa on the 29th of April 2022. Grove Green was able to take a major stride in the Hikkaduwa wastewater treatment plant. The treated wastewater was being discharged to the nearby water resources, and this discharged water is highly eutrophicated with high concentrations of Nitrogen and Phosphorus, which is hazardous for the sheltered habitats for fish, corals, and algae. The restoration was done on the treatment plant side bank with more than 250 'Bruguiera Gymnorhiza' mangrove plants. The project was carried out along with an awareness session as well. A monitoring session will follow this phase in another six months to monitor the progress.

Grove Green is a successful attempt to protect water chemistry in the face of the most serious hazard of severely eutrophicated water.



3. Urbanscape

Urbanscape is an initiative that was brought into life by the Environmental Service Avenue for the first time with the intention of promoting urban edible gardening while taking necessary provisions to establish urban gardening structures in urban areas. The vision of Urbanscape is to build a community of urban citizens who aspire to go the greenway and contribute to environmental conservation in the long run.

The project was carried out under two main phases, where the first phase was utilized to raise public awareness on urban gardening through social media platforms. The second phase was a venture to put the concept of urban gardening into implementation.

The project was executed targeting urban citizens as the beneficiaries. LAK Arcade Pvt. Ltd and Student's Society of Landscape Architecture partnered up with the project as the Financial Partner and Knowledge Partner respectively.

Under the phase one, a flyer and video series were circulated on social media platforms sharing valuable information on the topic, including the most up-to-date urban gardening concepts, shedding a light on the benefits of supplying one's own food, Balcony Gardening, the varieties of indoor plants ideal to create one's personal forest, etc. This was followed by an online workshop to give further knowledge on urban gardening not only in your personal areas but also in public areas. An article writing competition named "Green Vibes" was

conducted to share successful urban gardening stories and encourage others to get on board with it.

Growroom

As the initiation of the second phase, the 'Growroom' concept is brought forth and this is the first time in Sri Lanka to build and promote Growrooms to spread awareness on urban gardening. Standing tall as a spherical garden, Grow Room empowers people to grow their own food locally in a beautiful and sustainable way. The initial structure for the implementation was designed this year and surveys were conducted to collect details on the location we intend to establish. The initial idea was to choose University premises as the location.

Urbanscape paves the way to less spaced urban communities where they are encouraged to contribute to the environment. Furthermore, it can be identified as an attempt in reducing the high percentage of carbon dioxide footprint in urban areas. Taking this project forward more effectively will definitely provide relief to this problem.

Initially starting from the University level, the project Urbanscape will level up its standards gradually in public places and broaden the public's focus and awareness of the project. With Urbanscape, we focus on achieving SDGs, "Affordable and Clean Energy", "Sustainable Cities and Communities" and "Partnership for the Goals". Moreover, it focuses on achieving Rotary Focus Area, "Economic and Community Development".

4. Woof Roof

'Woof Roof' was initiated to rescue the lives of innocent street dogs from abuse and abandonment by providing

them with a caring roof, by bridging the gap between interested parties and street dogs while also raising

public awareness about animal care. This opens doors for gentle-hearted volunteers to give their hands to those innocent paws by finding them a loving home at each stage of the project.

"Woofy's Competition" was a photography and art competition about street dogs held as a subproject of "Woof Roof" to generate more social awareness about the innocent lives of street dogs. Despite the committee's intention to primarily draw university students to the initiative, due to its widespread popularity in the community, many Rotaractors from outside RotaractMora, as well as undergraduates from several universities, participated. The winners were chosen based on the likes received for each photograph on Facebook. Despite the fact that the project is still in its early stages, the competition has already received a massive 37k+ digital reach in a short amount of time.



The next step: the Adoption Program was allocated for rescuing street dogs, conducting medical checkups, and giving them away for adoption. It was planned to carry out a PR campaign to spread the word about the initiative and encourage people to bring the street dogs in their vicinity to the location. Dog lovers who were looking to adopt a street pooch were also to be invited, where we ultimately find loving homes for these dogs. Before giving them away for adoption, the plan was to conduct a medical check-up for those street dogs and a basic vaccine program free of charge. However, due to the pandemic, the Adoption Program could not be seen to its conclusion.

Shifting gears, team Woof Roof strategically changed courses to focus on a different endeavor that involved feeding the strays and medicating them for their skin infections. As a collaboration with the International Services joint project 'Dusty Paws', on the 26th of January 2022, members from both Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa and Rotaract Club of Yala, Nepal stepped out to the streets to feed the hungry stray dogs and treat them with the Amoxicillin tablet.

Team Woof Roof was unable to have Woof Roof days once again due to the pandemic. As the famous saying goes, "every cloud has a silver lining". The silver lining of the challenging circumstances was that it broadened the target audience and brought international recognition to Woof Roof. Moreover, the responsibility of continuing the project by conducting Adoption days and follow-up programs will be handed over to the Rotaract year 2022-23.

5. CleanSL

CleanSL was a District Initiative hosted by RotaractMora together with 10 other clubs in RID 3220, that focuses on the prevention of mismanaged waste entering waterways and ultimately flowing into the ocean.

Mitsubishi Corporation joined hands with the project as the Exclusive Strategic Partner, Marine Environment Protection Authority as the Official Technical Partner, Green Building Council of Sri Lanka as the Official Knowledge Partner, and One Among Trees as the Official Coordinating Partner joined hands with the project.

The project was carried out under 3 main phases: Awareness Sessions, Installation of trash traps, and Beach Cleanups. Trash traps were implemented in Weligama to prevent the enlarging of polythene and plastics into the sea. Along with this effort, once the trash trap was installed, there was a waste collection session with the participation of the collaborators of this project where we were able to discuss removing the trapped trash on the installed trash trap. The conclusion of the project was marked with the first-ever Underwater Cleanup at

Unawatuna along with a Beach Cleanup on the 26th of April, 2022. It was conducted successfully, collecting more than 500kg of trash with the participation of 100+ Rotaractors.

CleanSL carried out achieving SDGs, Clean Water and Sanitation, Life Below Water, Partnership for the Goals and Rotary Focus Areas, Water and Sanitation and Economy and Community Development.

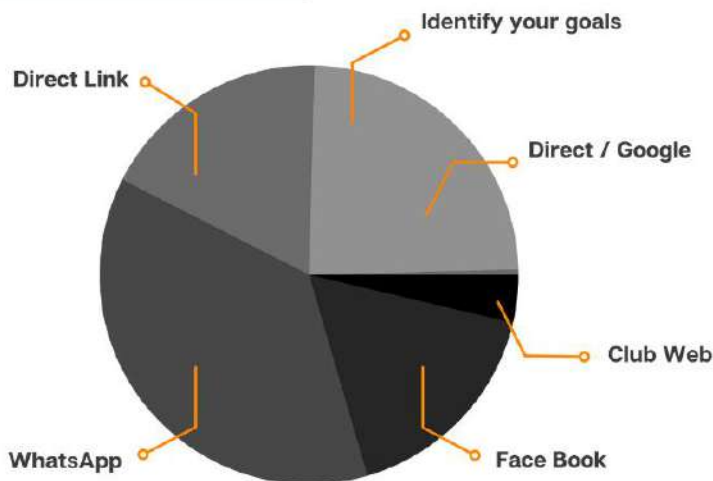

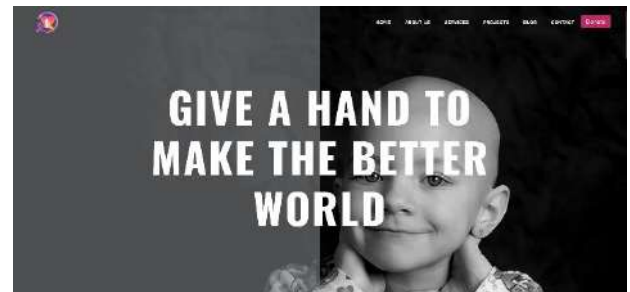
NEW INITIATIVES THIS YEAR

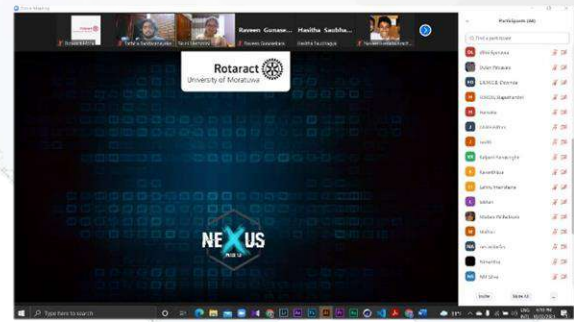
Suwa Kekulu

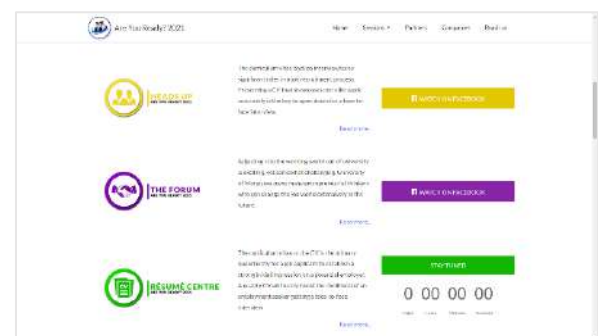

"Pearl Pacify 1.0," organized by Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa, is one of the most-anticipated projects that was launched for the first time, based on the X-press Pearl ship sink disaster recovery management, with the goal of coming up with all possible solutions to minimize the adverse effects of the disaster to the ocean and marine life, in collaboration with the Interact Club of Isipathana College.

The project is divided into two phases: the Global Recovery Solution Competition and the Nurdle Collecting Campaign.

Global Recovery Solution Competition – Competencia

The Recovery Solution Competition 'Competencia' executed as a sub-project of Pearl Pacify 1.0 created the platform for the environmental enthusiasts to research and come up with innovative, yet feasible solutions for the crisis. A comprehensive evaluation was conducted by the project's Knowledge Partners, the Engineering & Innovation Club of Ocean University, Sri Lanka, and Pearl Protectors. Being highly driven by research, their associations were beneficial in sustaining high standards throughout the challenge. The winning solution was ultimately chosen, after which it will be implemented with the support and backing of Pearl Pacify's Exclusive Project Partner, MAS Holdings (Pvt) Ltd.



Because 'Competencia' was a research-based competition, a webinar was held prior to the competition

to encourage knowledge sharing on the topic. It was led by top-tier experts in their disciplines, including Dr. Ajantha Perera, a social activist and scientist, and Mr. Muditha Katuwawala, the coordinator from Pearl Protectors. With a 300+ virtual global audience, this initiative gave a massive kick start to the competition.

The competition mainly focuses on bringing up innovative solutions to prevent similar disasters like the X-press Pearl ship-fire, minimizing adverse effects of disasters, and educating people about the necessary measures they could take to uplift the betterment of the marine life and conserve the scenic beaches and the ocean around Sri Lanka.

Soon after the competition ended, team Pearl Pacify planned to convert the official website into a Disaster Recovery Hub and upload all the pioneering solutions into the hub, in order to edify the citizens in the society, government authorities, and other organizations.



Nurdle Collecting Campaign

In the second phase, we began our needle collection drive in collaboration with The Pearl Protectors Sri Lanka and the Interact Club of Isipathana College. Nurdle collection initiatives have been held at the beaches of Egoda Uyana, Galle face, Wellawatte, and Negombo. It is

noteworthy to mention that with the help of hundreds of volunteers based on Rotaract, Interact and Rotary Clubs, 200kg of Nurdles, 180kg of Plastic, and 35kg of Glass were collected through this nurdle collecting campaign, after

which a new Nurdle Portal was set up in Dehiwala. In the end, the Pearl Pacify crew won an award and appreciation for volunteering for The Pearl Protectors' Nurdle collection initiative.

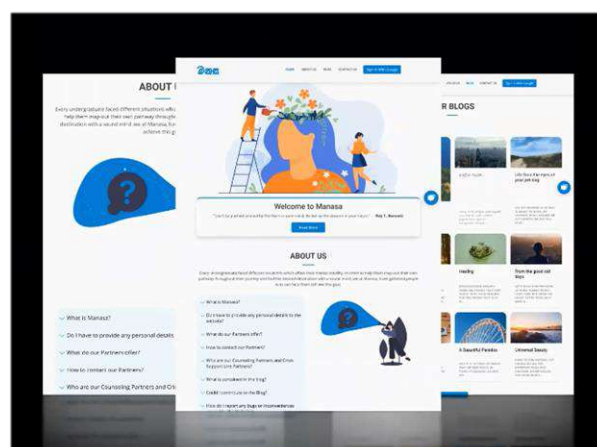

With the hopes of uplifting the Mental Health of university students during the global pandemic, the Rotaract Clubs of University of Moratuwa and Achievers Lanka Business School banded together to unfold the second edition of project Manasa, the first-ever university-based virtual consultancy forum on the Importance of Mental Health through factual webinars & noteworthy mentoring sessions. This strives to achieve a balance in both the physical and mental well-being of undergraduates, which in turn will help them to perform better in academics as well as other activities in life.

The project kicked off by conducting an online survey to get an understanding of the mental health issues faced by the undergraduates. Based on the survey, the project team organized a panel discussion addressing the most prevalent issues and creating a platform for the student community to express their feelings and trials they go through so that they can be connected to professionals and be given effective solutions. The panel discussion was held on the 19th of October 2021 with two experts in the field Dr. Medhani Hewagama, a consultant psychiatrist, and Mrs. Uwasara Arambewala, a clinical psychologist. It is believed that the panel discussion was

beneficial to take the very necessary step to reach the ultimate goal of combating the stigma around mental health. The discussion ended with a 100+ virtual audience and a wave of great feedback from the audience, where the team was commended for bringing up a little-discussed aspect of health in an interesting and informative manner.



In addition, the Manasa website was relaunched, introducing several advanced features and also fresh content related to mental well-being written by the undergraduates in the university. The 'Communication Bot' which provides a means for anyone to reach a friend or an expert in the field when they need help was an added feature to the website. This serves as a platform that connects the victims with the relevant professionals.

Manasa was able to uplift the Mental Health of university students by making them aware of its importance, helping them permanently resolve such problems, and encouraging the community as a whole to look beyond this barrier and strive to alleviate this problem.

Mahatma Gandhi once said "You must not lose faith in humanity. Humanity is an ocean; if a few drops of the ocean are dirty, the ocean does not become dirty." Can it be proven?

This is a challenge Rotaractors of Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa took on with the project "No More Corona". Ever since the global outbreak of covid-19 in 2019, the world has been in turmoil. It has disrupted the peace in families and the pace of the rat race for survival has increased beyond limits. At such difficult times, RotaractMora took the initiative in taking the first step toward change, because we as a club believe that change does not start with the society, rather it begins with a few individuals who believe in change, which would ultimately lead to changing the community.

'No More Corona' is an effort of RotaractMora that has proceeded in association with Rotaract District 3220, under the district initiative 'Stop the Spread: Beyond Covid-19' where the Sri Lankan youth rally to help curtail the spread of Covid-19 and help the country recover and bounce back from the halt. Taking forward the initiative from the last Rotaract year, this year 'No More Corona' was conducted in two phases: the Poster Campaign and the Donation Drive under the 'Back to School' initiative.

The social media Poster Campaign under 'No More Corona' was carried out to give a glimpse of awareness of Covid-19, where it initially kicked off with a flyer series to express gratitude towards the heroes of the time; the front-line workers, who sacrifice their lives on a daily basis for the greater good of the nation. The next set of material brought awareness on the newly developed virus at the time Omicron and the Booster vaccine.

Donation Drive under 'Back to School' Initiative:

The 'Back to School' initiative done by Rotary Sri Lanka was introduced with the main objective of assisting the Sri

Lankan government in creating a safe enough environment to open schools for students to proceed with their usual routine of learning, with RotaractMora accommodating three schools.



On the 3rd of January 2022, the team completed the first milestone of the Donation Drive, where they visited two of the schools; Sunethradevi Girls' College, Pepiliyana and Sri Rahula Maha Vidyalaya, Kotte to donate 1200 reusable masks, 1100 kids' surgical masks, 30 litres of sanitizer and 2 pedal sinks. With this endeavour, 'No More Corona' was able to benefit over 400 students; where we laid the foundation for them to get a second chance to live a memorable school life. On the 31st of January, the team visited Siri Parakumbha Vidyalaya, Rajagiriya where 200 reusable masks, 400 kids' surgical masks, 10 litres of sanitizer, and 10 pedal sinks of 25-liter capacity were donated, thus successfully bringing the Donation Drive to an end.

As the name 'Stop the Spread: Beyond Covid-19' suggests, we believe 'No More Corona' is about upgrading ourselves and giving the community a hand to stand up on their own feet and creating the necessary environment for them to take care of themselves and protect their families.

4. Rotaract Champions League

Rotaract Champions League (RCL) the biggest and most renowned sporting events among the Rotaractors across Sri Lanka. This year RCL was held zonally with seven competitive sports, Cricket, Athletics, Badminton, Table Tennis, Carrom, Chess, and Futsal. The first phase of the RCL 2022 commenced on the 26th of February 2022 in Kandy, likewise, the second phase was held at Jaffna on the 27th of March. RotaractMora competed under the third phase that was held in Colombo on both 19th of March and the 27th of April. The members displayed passion, dedication and sportsmanship during the events they participated, while building fellowship with Rotaractors from other clubs.



TOGETHERSL



TogetherSL – ‘Sarubima’

With the newly imposed restrictions on chemical fertilizers, farmers across the country have focused their interest on organic fertilizer production. Addressing this pressing issue, Rotaractors from 13 Rotaract Clubs in Rotary International District 3220 banded together to initiate project ‘Sarubima’ under the district initiative ‘TogetherSL’. Deciding to aid several farmers at the Pelmadulla Divisional Secretariat in the Ratnapura District, the primary aim was to establish a market for organic fertilizer production in the area and to introduce and encourage organic fertilizer production. The initial stage of the project was conducted to gain information on how to approach the situation as the selected group of farmers had a variety of people with different ideas and intentions. The project team intended to identify the most efficient mode to extend the helping hand in order to uplift their financial status and to help the industry to grow into a stable and sustainable source of income. Both government authorities such as the Agrarian Development Authority as well as the private sector in the form of Chemical Industries Colombo (CIC) were reached in order to obtain support both technically and financially.

The fruit of all the hard work put into the project was seen in the form of a seminar and a donation drive. The

seminar was conducted at the Agrarian Development Office in Pelmadulla with the participation of the targeted fertilizer producers, which was conducted by Senior Lecturer Jagath Kulathilaka from the University of Uva Wellassa on the topic of Marketing of Organic Fertilizer and Mr. Thilakasiri Hewagamage, Director Inservice Institute Bandarawela on the topic of Efficient Manufacturing Processes. The resource personnel joined via video conferencing and the participants were able to gain much-needed knowledge as well as clarify all of the doubts regarding the manufacturing and marketing processes. The webinar was followed by the donation drive in which the selected organic fertilizer manufacturers were provided with supplies to boost their production. The supplies included a 20L barrel, a 10L can, machetes and a spray can for each of them. The primary objective was not to have a donation of major value but a driving force of encouragement for the initiative. With positive feedback and loads of words of appreciation, the team intends to continue the support and guidance extended towards the organic fertilizer manufacturing community whilst inspiring the other farmers in the area of Pelmadulla in the voyage of organic agriculture.
