
To promote the event, the organizing committee utilized social media platforms and strategically placed posters within the university premises.

Thus, through these, we aim to advocate equal learning rights, provide as many learning opportunities and make them feel seen. Providing quality educational content to the visually impaired community is our prime goal and we at Manusath Handa have put together a rich array of recordings generously voiced by dedicated volunteers from University of Moratuwa. Our website, manusathhanda.rotaractmora.org

hosts these recordings through an audio library that has a collection of 600+ audio clips covering diverse aspects including newspaper articles, exam papers, magazine articles, entertainment dialogues, and much more.

Despite our efforts, we believe our story hasn't reached enough ears. This year, we're determined to amplify awareness about Manusath Handa within Sri Lanka and internationally through Rotaract, aiming to make our cause known to a broader audience.

To ensure the credibility and quality of our content we have also collaborated with Vijaya Newspapers and the Department of Examinations. To enhance engagement, we're planning interactive sessions at schools for impaired students and visually introducing them to our project's providing easier mission while to our audio library. access Furthermore, going beyond digital we've donated accessibility, physical recordings to blind schools as optical drives.

In addition to our main objectives, we aim to expand our content to serve the global community aiming for international recognition from the blind community. Additionally, we expect to launch a mobile app, acknowledging the preference for mobile access, which will make our content even more accessible.

"Revitalizing Rural Resilience: Grama Probodaya's mission to fix water filtration systems in Kahatagasdigiliya, Kukulewa, and Anuradhapura for sustainable community development."

"Grama Probodaya" is a project initiated to support rural Sri Lankan villages that are in dire need of assistance and development into self-sustaining units. This time, the project is taking a significant step toward community development this year by focusing on revitalizing the water supply system in Kahatagasdigiliya, Kukulewa, and Anuradhapura. A thorough investigation uncovered a critical issue, a malfunctioning motor in the water filtering system.

This breakdown has had profound consequences, leaving rural inhabitants grappling with severe water shortages, health concerns, and a lack of access to clean water. In response, the project is collaborating with Aqua Safe to procure and install a new motor, which is the essential component of the filtering system. Beyond infrastructure repair, this initiative is a commitment to enhancing the overall well-being of the community by ensuring a sustainable and reliable water supply. Through these concerted efforts, the aim is to alleviate the challenges faced by the people of Kahatagasdigiliya, fostering a healthier and more resilient community for years to come

'Akuru', a sub-project under the Grama Probodaya initiative, is dedicated to the development and facilitation of libraries. Proposed to be implemented across 5-10 libraries in the Kahatagasdigiliya area, the project aims to create cultural and educational spaces. By promoting access to literature, 'Akuru' seeks to empower individuals in rural communities, fostering intellectual growth and community development. Through this initiative, the project aspires to instill a love for reading, and curiosity, and contribute to the overall enrichment of the communities.




# THE GLOBAL WANDERLUST
